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## From the Pastor's Desk

## The Truth of Easter

...but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. - John 20:31

As we enter into the season of Easter, we are given space to consider the unknowingly profound question posed by Pontius Pilate to Jesus. He asks our savior, in the midst of a trial decided by public opinion a rather deep question: "What is truth?" As Christians, this question is easy to answer but when faced with the pressures of the culture we may not be so quick to answer. In our world today, where truth often seems elusive and subjective, the message of Easter stands as an unshakable testament to the ultimate truth—the truth that transcends all human understanding and experience. The truth the gives us strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow.

Easter is not merely an event we commemorate once a year; it is the very heartbeat of our Christian faith—the undeniable reality of Jesus Christ's resurrection. This pivotal moment in history not only validates Jesus' teachings but also affirms His identity as the Son of God and the Savior of humanity. Without it we are, as Paul says in 1 Corinthians, ones to be most pitied. With it we are validated in our faith and given a vivid picture of our eternity.

In the Gospel of John, we find a powerful connection to this truth. John himself articulates the purpose of his gospel, stating, "But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." Easter is the culmination of John's gospel narrative—the moment when the truth of Jesus' identity and mission is revealed in all its glory.

In a culture where we'd rather explore "my" truth, Easter dares to proclaims the truth, one that is absolute and unchanging—that Jesus conquered sin and death, offering forgiveness and eternal life to all who believe in Him. This truth is not contingent on human opinion or interpretation but is firmly rooted in the unchanging promises of God's Word.

As we reflect on the profound significance of Easter, let us remember that the truth it proclaims is not confined to a single day but permeates every aspect of our lives. It is a truth that offers hope in the midst of despair, healing in the midst of brokenness, redemption in the midst of sin, and resurrection in the face of death. In a world that is hungry for truth, let's keep boldly proclaiming the message of Easter—the message that sets us free from the bondage of sin and offers the promise of new life in Christ. Let us be beacons of light and agents of truth in a world that is often clouded by darkness and deception. May this Easter be a time of renewal and transformation as we embrace the truth of Christ's resurrection and allow it to shape our hope, our lives and our witness to the world.

## APRIL IS STRESS AWARENESS MONTH

Stress is your body's response to a challenge or demand, and not all of those responses are negative. Common stressors may include preparing for vacation, getting a speeding ticket, taking out a loan, troubles at work, getting married, having a baby and lots of other everyday life events.

When you experience stress, your body releases the hormones adrenaline and cortisol, which increase alertness and put you in a "fight or flight" mode. When this happens, you may experience an increase in blood pressure, heart rate and blood sugar.

Stress is a part of life—everyone experiences stress now and then—and short-term stress can be helpful. For example, stress can help you meet a deadline or prevent a car accident.

It's the long-term stress, also called chronic stress, that's unhealthy. Chronic stress can cause serious mental and physical health problems, and it's an issue that's becoming more common.

Here are some healthy ways to manage stress:

- **Deep breathing.** Studies show that slow, deep breathing can help lower blood pressure and reduce cortisol levels.
- Exercise. Regular physical activity can significantly reduce stress. **Get outside.** Multiple studies have linked spending time in nature to improved mood.
- **Healthy eating.** Prevent unhealthy weight gain and disease by eating a regular healthy diet of fruits and vegetables, lean proteins, whole grains and non or low-fat dairy. Limit alcohol intake and avoid using drugs to deal with stress.
- **Mindfulness and meditation.** Like deep breathing, <u>mindfulness</u> and meditation have been linked to lower blood pressure and reduced cortisol levels. They may also reduce symptoms of anxiety and depression and help you sleep.
- **Sleep.** Getting enough sleep can help improve your thought process and mood. Aim for eight to nine hours every night.
- Lessen the amount of time you spend following the news.

## Bethlehem Mission News

Since we have had no updates our regular missionaries in time for this Messenger article, our weekly prayers this month will focus on prayers for the persecuted Church in "closed" or sensitive parts of the world, as reported by OPEN DOORS, who along with Voice of the Martyrs, has long ministered to and prayed for Christian Believers in those parts of the world! Bob's sister and brother-in-law, Rebecca and Dean Keaney, have served with Open Doors for many years, based in Australia and The Philippines; so we regularly pray for the suggested needs in their bimonthly Prayer Calendar. Last week's prayers even focused on the persecution going on in Laos, where Tim, Michelle and Sarah work! So I hope you won't mind my departing from our usual special missionary prayers and have us focus on our prayers on some of the hardest missions work going on in our world today! During April we will particularly focus on the secret believers and persecuted in Sri Lanka, Laos, The Maldives, and China.

#### PRAY FOR US

## April 7 - Laos

Since persecution has risen sharply in Laos, pray with Open Doors local partners as they respond to increasing incidents of violence. Pray also for leaders of a growing house church in southern Laos, as police tried to stop construction on a building, that the Lord would give them wisdom as they navigate this difficult opposition. Pray also for the sons of a pastor who were detained by police for leading a Bible study. Ask God to embolden them to continue to visit believers, and to watch over the believers who opened their home for the Bible study.

#### **April 14 - The Maldives**


The Maldives, an island nation who declares itself to be 100% Muslim, makes clear that anyone who leaves Islam must keep their faith secret. Pray for the peace of these believers, and that this would be the year that secret believers could access the Bible. In their own language. Pray for the country's new President Mohamed Muizzi, that he will embrace freedom for religious minorities, and that Christians in the Maldives will be encouraged, knowing they are part of a global, praying family of Christ.

## April 21 - Sri Lanka

Five years ago on Easter Sunday, April 21st, Islamic extremists in Sri Lanka bombed three churches! This is an especially difficult day of remembrance. Pray by name for Zion Church Pastor Kumaran and his wife Samantha, who lost their 12-year-old son Malkiya in the attack on their church, a mother named Kuweni whose youngest son Kevin was killed, that she would know God's love for her, and pray also for Praba, a Sunday School teacher at Zion Church who lost her eight-year-old son Peter in the attack. Praba shared that because people who had never seen them were praying for them, they have been able to stay strong in their faith!

#### April 28 - China

Pray with church leaders in south China who were arrested last year. One of their wives posted an open letter online sharing how his arrest has devastated their family. Pray for her and their son who is away at school, that they would know the Church is praying for them. Pray for all those imprisoned for the gospel. "Remember the prisoners as though you were in prison with them..." (Heb.13:3)

## THREE ZONE GATHERING



## **Easter Joy for Everyday Life**

More than just a day, the Church gives us a seven-week Easter season to celebrate. Yet sometimes our everyday lives feel so heavy that celebration is not a part of them. Critical illness in the family, loss of a job, disappointment in a relationship and the burdens of everyday life can make it a challenge to feel particularly joyful – even in the Easter season.

But the joy we are being invited into this season is beyond what we see in our everyday lives. It's true that Jesus says "Come to me and bring me your burdens" but we usually can't believe it. Maybe we don't want to believe it. If I really allow Jesus to come into my heart the way he wants to, will he ask me to change my life in ways that are too hard? How do I share the chaos of my life with Jesus? If I keep him at arm's length, my life might be difficult, but at least my problems are familiar. What would it cost me to let go and change my life?

We know our own faults and failings so well. Too well. We begin to believe that Jesus loves the way we love – with all of our human limits. How could Jesus love us and accept us the way we are right now? Maybe when we fix a few things about our lives, love our spouse a little better, stop being so critical of family members, stop drinking, stop nagging, love a little more... when we are perfect, then Jesus will love us.

If we can overcome our fears, the real power of letting Jesus into our hearts is how free our hearts will become. Suddenly, we are not afraid, not burdened and simply ready to serve with Jesus.


Jesus loves us - right now. At this moment, Jesus holds each one of us in his warm and loving gaze and loves us so freely at a depth that our human minds can't take in. Whether we comprehend this or not, Jesus loves us endlessly and waits for us with his arms open, ready to hold and support us.

As we receive his embrace and feel the peace and joy of Easter wash over us, we can look over his shoulder, and see beyond to those in need who now wait for us. That's when we realize that the real joy in our lives is putting aside our own faults, challenges and difficulties for a while and entering into the lives of others.

Pope Francis said at Easter, we leave ourselves behind and encounter others by "being close to those crushed by life's troubles, sharing with the needy, and standing at the side of the sick, elderly and the outcast."

We are being missioned as Easter People. We find peace in Jesus' love for us and now we share it with others. We find ourselves standing side by side with Jesus, looking together at those we are being sent to love.

That is where the real joy of Easter waits for us.

The February, 2024 regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:36 PM by President Greg Shediack.

Pastor Ahlersmeyer began the meeting with a devotion focused on Psalm 51 as David repents of his sins to the Lord. How do we respond when we are caught in sin? Do we acknowledge our sin and repent as David did or rather do we look for excuses? Pastor concluded the devotion with prayer.

The Board next reviewed and discussed a presentation led by Mark Blessing on how Bethlehem might be best organized to interact with other organizations as we seek ways to better utilize portions of our facility, specifically the currently underused space previously occupied by the school. After reviewing the suggestions, the board agreed by consensus that the next step would be to schedule an informational session for the congregation. It was determined that the optimal time to do this would be shortly after Easter. The informational session will be held after the Sunday Service on April 14<sup>th</sup>.

At 7:39, Caleb was excused to attend a prior commitment.

The Board next reviewed the minutes from the January 9<sup>th</sup> meeting. They were unanimously approved as submitted on a motion by Brian Bates and A second by Evans Branigan.

Treasurer Brian Bates presented the January, 2024 Financial Report. Monthly income for January was \$25,289 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Monthly expenses for January totaled \$37,800, compared with monthly budget amount of \$40,010. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of January was \$1,117,916 and the balance in the SSMG Scholarship Fund was \$58,569. The Financial Report was unanimously approved on a motion by John Stafford and a second by Natalie Reynolds.

The Soul Accounting report, as previously approved by the Board of Elders, was reviewed. It included the baptism of Craig Bradley on January 27<sup>th</sup> and new members received, Craig and Jennifer Bradley, also on January 27<sup>th</sup>. The report was accepted as submitted by the Board of Elders.

The Pastor's report included an update on the Mission Clarity process and an update on his progress in the Doctorate of Ministry program.

Natalie Reynolds provided an update on activities at LSUS. Enrollment remains steady and is currently at 196.

Under new business, the Board, on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by John Stafford, unanimously agreed to dedicate the Lenten Services offerings to the Neighborhood Benevolent Fund. The Board was also updated on discussions being held jointly with Peace for conducting a Summer Vacation Bible program.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 8:13 PM.
