From the Pastor's Desk



Imprinted Images

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. - Colossians 1:15

As we journey through these final weeks of Lent, the hymn "On my heart imprint your image" continues to be on my mind. It is one we have closed each midweek service with throughout the Lenten season. It echoes the profound truth of Scripture: Christ is "the image of the invisible God." Week after week, we've paused, looked, and reflected—allowing artistic images to guide our meditation on Christ's path to the cross. These visual reflections have been more than mere illustrations; they've been windows into understanding the very image of God revealed in Jesus.

Our Lenten path is not about remaining in darkness, but about moving towards an ultimate, transformative light. Each image we've contemplated—each brushstroke of suffering, each shadow of sacrifice—has been revealing the depth of God's love. Christ, as the perfect image of God, shows us that suffering is not the end, but a pathway to a new beginning.

As we approach Easter, our hearts are being prepared—not just to remember Christ's crucifixion, but to anticipate and celebrate His resurrection. The images imprinted on our hearts are shifting from the somber tones of Good Friday to the brilliant, hope-filled palette of Easter morning.

Sin darkens. Resurrection brightens.

This is the promise that transforms everything. The cross is not the final word; the empty tomb is. Where sin would leave us in perpetual shadow, the resurrection floods our world with bright colors of hope. It's a hope that doesn't ignore suffering, but transcends it. A hope that doesn't deny pain, but redeems it.

What images are being imprinted on your heart these days? Are they images of limitation, of past struggles, of perceived dead ends? The resurrection invites us to see differently. It whispers that endings are not final, that hope can bloom even in the most unexpected places. The resurrection of Christ gives us a clear picture of what our future will be. It is firmly imprinted on our hearts so we can remain hopeful in all circumstances.

In these remaining weeks of Lent, we are invited to continue preparing our hearts. Let the images of Christ's journey sink deep—not to leave you in sorrow, but to lift you towards the joy that is coming. Easter is approaching, and with it, a radiant reminder that life conquers death, love overcomes darkness, and hope always—always—has the last word.

We went to Community Harvest three times this month to purchase 1,522# of food in the amount of \$792. Our 15 volunteers gave 104 hours of their time.

Bethlehem Mission News and Prayers



We got a personal update from Sarah's parents, Tim and Michelle this past week bringing us up to date on a few of their team projects! In January, they enjoyed recording word lists with believers from two Southeast Asian language groups who do not yet have a writing system. Recording and analyzing a word list is the first step in the process to develop an alphabet, a key tool for Bible Translation. In March they and a couple colleagues who are linguistic consultants, to work together to begin this exciting step! They are thanking us and all of you for the Lord's provision through you to help in the Bible Translation process in more language communities.

Jeanne Burger at New Life Lutheran Church asked for prayers for a new vicar family in Puerto Rico: Vicar Paul and Courtney Mroczenski and their baby daughter Jaqueline were welcomed into the church in Ponce, PR. Pray for them as Vicar Paul teaches and preaches at various churches and sites in both Spanish and English, and assist with church planting and other evangelism and mercy work efforts. Pray that God will help Vicar Paul and his wife learn Spanish and adapt quickly to their new home.



DR. GEORGE FRY PRESENTS "THE FALL OF ROME"

Monday, April 28, 2025

"And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed." Luke 2:1 KJV. Thus, by God's providence the first Roman emperor issued the order from Rome that directed Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem where our Savior was born. For several centuries Rome was a great world power, yet by 476 A.D. the Roman emperor was overthrown by barbarians, and the Roman Empire collapsed. Why did Rome fall? Do all great nations eventually meet their end? Dr. George Fry returns to Bethlehem to answer these questions in his presentation "The Fall of Rome." A longtime friend of Bethlehem, Dr. Fry was a professor for many years at Concordia Theological Seminary, Indiana-Purdue Fort Wayne, and St. Francis College. 
April is Stress Awareness Month


Stress is our body's reaction to challenges or demands, whether physical, mental, or emotional. In today's world, stress is more often caused by work, school, relationships, or societal pressures.

When stress becomes chronic, however, it can have negative effects on our well-being, leading to physical, mental, and emotional strain. Understanding stress is the first step toward taking control of it.

While some signs are obvious, others may be more subtle. Some common symptoms to watch out for:







If you notice a combination of these symptoms in your daily life, it may be time to take a step back and assess your stress levels. The sooner you recognize it, the sooner you can address it.

Over time stress can affect both your mental and physical health:

- **Mental Health**: Chronic stress is linked to anxiety, depression, and burnout. It can cloud your thinking, make you less productive, and reduce your ability to enjoy life.
- **Physical Health**: Stress weakens the immune system, increases blood pressure, and contributes to heart disease, diabetes, and other chronic conditions.
- **Relationships**: Stress can make us irritable, anxious, or withdrawn, which can strain relationships with family, friends, and coworkers.

Being aware of the effects of stress can help you take steps to manage it before it starts taking a significant toll. There are many ways to manage stress. Some strategies that can help you reduce stress:

- 1. Taking a few minutes each day to center yourself can be incredibly effective. Meditation is a great tool for calming the mind and relaxing your body.
- 2. Physical activity releases endorphins, the body's natural mood elevators. Even a short daily walk or stretching routine can make a huge difference in reducing stress levels.
- 3. Time management is key to preventing overwhelm. Break large tasks into smaller steps and give yourself breaks throughout the day. Prioritize what matters most, and remember, it's okay to say no.
- 4. Social connection is one of the most effective ways to reduce stress. Talking to someone who understands can provide a sense of relief and perspective.
- 5. Make time for activities that recharge you, whether it's reading, taking a bath, or pursuing a hobby. Don't feel guilty for taking time for yourself—it's essential for maintaining your mental health.
- 6. If stress is affecting your daily life, don't hesitate to reach out to a mental health professional. Therapy, counseling, or even stress management workshops can provide valuable tools for coping with stress.

Managing stress isn't about eliminating it completely—it's about building resilience and learning to respond to stress in healthier ways..

Take a moment today to assess your stress levels and consider what small steps you can take to reduce it. It's okay to seek help and prioritize your well-being. Your mental and physical health are worth it.





Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting February 11, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: Evans Branigan and David Schult Guests: none

The February regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:30 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Galatians 6:9 "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up". He discussed how this passage relates to the work and mission of Bethlehem. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's January, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Brian Bates.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its February meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the death of Ilene Saalfrank on January 31, 2025.

Brian Bates presented the January Financial Report. Monthly income for January was \$26,701, including both offerings and extraordinary interest earnings, compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Monthly expenses for January totaled \$38,160, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$33,668. The expenses include unanticipated boiler repairs. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of January was \$1,337,380. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$24,943. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through January, we expended 9.5 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

Pastor's report noted that Kasey Hapner has been planning out worship music and plans for the Lenten Services. He also noted that the listening devices have been fixed and are now fully operational. Lastly, Pastor provided an update on this semester's independent study portion of his Doctor of Ministry program.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. The Committee met in early February with representatives of the City of Fort Wayne Department of Community Development and with Mary Ann Mings, the Executive Director of Inasmuch Ministry.

Under New Business, the Board adopted Resolution 2025-01 adding John Stafford to the individuals authorized to sign checks on behalf of Bethlehem Lutheran Church. The resolution was adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and second by Blake Sebring and passed unanimously.

Pastor provided an update on Lutheran South Unity Schools, particularly on how their building was successfully functioning with the temporary heating arrangement. Rachele Dance noted that the Missions Committee was heading up an effort to provide cupcakes to the staff at LSUS as a show of our appreciation for their dedication.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Dan Bates moved and Brian Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:45 PM.

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting March 11, 2025

The March regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:32 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on 1 Corinthians 15: 16 to 22. If we can imagine eternal life that can help guide our actions here on earth. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's February, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as corrected, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Blake Sebring. The Board discussed putting the draft minutes in the Messenger ahead of their formal approval at the subsequent Board meeting in order to more timely inform the members of the congregation of Board activities.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its March meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the death of Herman Guenin on February 28, 2025.

Brian Bates presented the February Financial Report. Monthly income for February was \$43,689, including both offerings of \$23,950 and miscellaneous receipts of \$19,739, compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Miscellaneous receipts included both a memorial to the church and a \$2,500 contribution from Mt. Calvary Lutheran Church in appreciation for allowing their temporary use of space in our building. Income through the first two months of the year totaled \$70,389 compared with a budgeted amount of \$53,667. Monthly expenses for February totaled \$28,293, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$33,668. Expenses for the year through February totaled \$66,453. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of February was \$1,360,061. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through January as we had not yet received the February statement. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$25,549. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through February, we expended 16.45 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

Pastor's report provided an update on the Lenten Services. Pastor also provided an update on this semester's independent study portion of his Doctor of Ministry program. He next distributed some thoughts to the Board members regarding Bethlehem's Vision, Mission and Values for our review. The Board will further discuss the topic at the April meeting.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. They discussed the information learned at the fourth and final workshop sponsored by Sacred Places in Indianapolis conducted on February 18th. We will be applying for a Sacred Places grant to undertake a building assessment examining potential upgrades and improvements that may be needed. The Committee, along with a representative from the Committee on Building and Grounds is currently reviewing the responses from architectural firms and will be selecting a firm to undertake the assessment. Lastly, Blake noted that the Committee will be meeting on March 18th with a group of local non-profit organizations which work with youth.

Pastor provided an update on the heating situation at LSUS, noting that to date the temporary solution appears to be working successfully. Rachele Dance noted that cupcakes had been provided by Bethlehem to the LSUS staff in appreciation for their dedication to the students.


