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From the Pastor's Desk



A Season of Light

Winter nights have a way of settling deep into the soul. Darkness stretches long and wide, wrapping the world in a kind of stillness that can feel both heavy and expectant. Yet, even in this long shadowed season, light has a way of speaking. It flickers in a single candle, weaves across rooftops in strings of Christmas bulbs, and glints in frosted windows. Light insists on being seen, on breaking through. And for those who follow Christ, this is no accident. Light is at the heart of the story we live by because it is at the heart of who He is.

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone" (Isaiah 9:2). These words of the prophet Isaiah ring out across centuries, as bold and urgent as the first rays of dawn. They remind us of something we can forget in our weariness: God's light is not afraid of the dark. It enters shadowy places, speaks into chaos, and kindles hope where there was none.

This Advent and Christmas season, we'll spend a lot of time talking about this light. We'll focus in on how God's light not only entered the world on that first Christmas night but continues to shine into the very fabric of our lives. Each week, we'll pause to see how Christ's light illumines different parts of our walk—our waiting, our weariness, our rejoicing, and even our grief. Advent begins with a spark of hope. As we wait for Christ's coming, we'll see how His light strengthens hearts that watch and yearn. From there, we'll follow the light's path, stretching far beyond Bethlehem. The prophets spoke of it reaching the nations—a beacon drawing all people to the God who created them. It shines in deserts, renewing what seems barren, and pierces shadows of fear and doubt with the promise of peace. On Christmas Eve, we'll gather in awe before the Light of the World, born in a manger, fulfilling God's promise to redeem what's broken.

But the light doesn't stop there. On the Sunday after Christmas, we'll sit with one of the most sobering stories in Scripture—the slaughter of the Holy Innocents. Here, the light confronts us with a hard truth: the world into which Christ was born is dark indeed. And yet, it's precisely into this brokenness that His light shines. The light of Christ is not fragile or fleeting; it meets sorrow head-on and overcomes.

As we move into Epiphany and beyond, the light continues to stretch. It touches all that it meets—transforming, healing, and calling us into a deeper trust in the God who walks with us. This is not just a poetic metaphor; it is the very reality of God's presence with us. The same God who spoke light into existence at creation, who guided His people with fire in the wilderness, has entered our world as the Light that no darkness can overcome.

So, as the season unfolds, let's pay attention. Let's watch for the light. Look for it in the glow of the Advent wreath, in the faces of those gathered around you, in the quiet moments of reflection, and in the Scriptures we read together. Above all, let's fix our eyes on Jesus, the true Light, who has come into the world for us all.

May His light fill you with hope, peace, and joy this Advent and Christmas. Pastor Ben

December 25, 2024 – Christmas Day Mundane and Beautiful - John 1:14 Rev. Jonathan Meyer (Guest Pastor)



We provided food to 395 individuals. They included 171 children under the age of 18, and 46 individuals over the age of 60. Our congregation provided 317# of food. We went to Community Harvest three times this month to purchase 1877# of food in the amount of \$772. Our 17 volunteers gave 140 hours of their time.

Bethlehem Mission News

As is often the case, today I watched and heard the Scriptures designated for the day twice, both during the live Bethlehem service as we were getting ready to attend Chapel here at LLV, where Bob is often the volunteer organist. Today Chaplain Mike Wakeland was preaching the sermon based on Mark 13, where Jesus prophesied that the stones of the temple would be destroyed, not one stone left on another! Then he went on to talk about would happen to them as His disciples, when persecution for their faith began to happen, and then turned in his Bible to 1st Peter 2. Here Peter is saying, "You are coming to Christ, the living cornerstone of God's temple....And you are living stones that God is building into his spiritual temple....The stone that the builders rejected has now become the cornerstone!" That reminded me that one of my favorite parts of our Bethlehem Lutheran Indiana Limestone building has always been the cornerstone in what used to be the well-used front door area of the building, where the school children of the neighborhood used to enter as they walked into the school. Unless you are old enough to have entered the school that way yourself, you may have never noticed that cornerstone! What it says, in the old King James Version is, "Suffer the little children, and forbid them not, to come unto Me, for of such is the Kingdom of heaven."

When I came back to Bethlehem for the second time to be the Kindergarten teacher, after having first taught second grade here right out of college, I would always sometime that first week of school bring the children out that front door to sit down and see that cornerstone. You see, that first week of Kindergarten I would teach them the Bible story of Jesus warning his disciples that he always had time for the children, and not to shoo them away! We would have pictures, finger plays, and songs about how much Jesus loved and valued the children! I was proud and thankful to be able to teach at a church and school where children were warmly welcomed and valued! So when Bethlehem and 3 other congregations had decided to unite our efforts in running one joint school, based at the former Unity Lutheran School, I felt very sad that for logistical reasons it would no longer in our Bethlehem building. But I was consoled to think we were still operating a mission outreach to the south side of Fort Wayne! And for many years of that partnership, I was thankful that our Bethlehem congregation was the largest financial support of LSUS. So today, when Charlotte kindly brought us a copy of today's voter's meeting agenda and budget for 2025, I was very disappointed that, due to budget problems of a shrinking congregation, we will no longer be supporting LSUS as a true arm of our congregation! This comes after the weekly prayers for missionaries have been eliminated from the Sunday prayers the last few months, because "those who are interested in missions can read about it in the Messenger." I contrast this with New Life Lutheran Church, a little storefront building across from the old Harvester building on East Coliseum, for whom missions, citywide, refugees and foreign, is their main focus, along with giving loving care and teaching to their neighbors and members. I know many people at Bethlehem are very interested in all kinds of missions, and individually support them through the envelopes and a \$4000 line budget item divided among 4 different missions for special needs. But I am glad that our dear Pastor David Schlie is no longer here to see us turn our backs on the importance of local missions! That, along with coming where there was at the time a vital youth program, was the main reason we transferred to Bethlehem from a large downtown congregation sitting on a very big endowment fund!

I pray I haven't offended anyone by these fairly strong words; but as your missions' secretary, I don't think I can keep silent on this issue. I sense the Holy Spirit wants me to speak them.

Mission Prayers for December Updates:

I have not heard yet for sure that Joe Boway has been able to return home to Fort Wayne as yet. I do know the roads were in such bad condition in rural Liberia, due to heavy rains, that they had to delay the reformation conference and the many baptisms being held. Todd Roeske posted many pictures on Facebook of his visits to churches and conferences in the Philippines and now has returned home, I believe. An excerpt from Tim and Michelle Miller's just received newsletter: Tim: "A series of podcasts on Jesus' Sermon on the Mount produced by The Bible Project has been a rich blessing to us this year. In one episode they summarize Jesus' 'Beatitudes' with these words: "Surprise! The Kingdom of Heaven has arrived! And the people taking hold of it are the outsiders - the unimportant- and the way they participate in it is through peacemaking and suffering." Tim continues "I heard these words while driving recently and felt so much emotion well up in my throat that I almost had to pull our car over. Only 6 weeks earlier while we were in the U.S. getting ready for our daughter Sarah's wedding, we heard the news that the life of an influential Khon pastor and friend ours had been cut short in a targeted attack that appears to have been an attempt to intimidate believers in the face of the church's growth. The event has shocked the Christian community among the Khon. But reading what Peter shares in 1st Peter 5 has comforted the Khon believers that God does care for them and will continue to take care of them! Please pray for our team and other Khon believers that these lessons can help confirm the same calling God has placed on their live so that Christ may be glorified in this nation

We have been delayed in receiving this newsletter because of the flooding of Florida by Helene, Tim shared when we called them about this! They have also just recovered from cases of Dengue Fever! Thankful!

And that choice still affects us all today.







Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting October 8, 2024

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Bake

Sebring, Greg Shediack and John Stafford

Members absent: none

Guests: none

The October 8th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:33 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Ephesians 2:20, we are "built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone." Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its October meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the baptisms of Finn Wild Geisler on August 31st and Lejla Christionna Mi Amor Bontempo on September 7th and the death of John Nahrwold on September 19th.

The minutes from the Board's September, 2024 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Blake Sebring.

Brian Bates presented the September Financial Report. Monthly offerings for September were \$28,748 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. \$30,000 was also transferred from the Endowment Fund to the Operating Fund. Monthly expenses for August totaled \$63,543, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. Monthly expenses in September were unusually high as the boiler repairs of approximately \$29,000 were paid in September. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of August was \$1,330,359. The balance reflected the June ending balance in the funds held with the Lutheran Foundation as the more recent statements have not yet been received. The Endowment Fund has also received a bequeath of \$208,000, which is reflected in the balance noted above. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$24,905. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through the first nine months of the year, we have expended 77 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. Four members of the Committee – Barb Netterville, Mark Blessing, Blake Sebring and John Stafford – will be attending the second day-long Sacred Places workshop on October 26th. Blake has taken the lead in preparing a draft case statement as required as a part of the Sacred Places program. The statement will need further input from the congregation as the process moves forward. Mark Blessing has taken the lead in working on the community fiscal impact of our congregation, another component of the information Sacred Places encourages us to prepare.

Under new business, the Board set Sunday, November 17th as the date for the next Voters Assembly and discussed items to be placed on the agenda for that Assembly.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:48 PM.

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Fort Wayne, Indiana Voters Assembly Sunday, May 19, 2024

The Voters Assembly was called to order by President Greg Shediack at 10:23 AM in the sanctuary. Forty-five members were present establishing a quorum.

The meeting was opened with a devotion provided by Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer.

Secretary John Stafford offered a motion to approve the minutes as presented from the November 19, 2023 Voters Assembly meeting. Steve Bercot provided a second and the motion unanimously passed.

Treasurer Brian Bates presented a financial update with information current through the month of April. A handout was also provided tracking year-to-date expenditures. Through one-third of the year, expenditures were at \$152,664 or 31.8 percent of the budgeted amount. The update was accepted on a voice vote upon a motion by Brian Bates and a second by David Schult.

The sole item of new business was a presentation and consideration of proposal regarding exploration of the potential future use of portions of the Bethlehem facility which currently are not being utilized to full potential. The presentation was made by Mark Blessing. Mark reviewed information that had previously been presented at the April 14th congregational information session.

Subsequent to the presentation, a motion was made Mark Blessing and seconded by David Schult to adopt the following resolution:

Bethlehem Congregation directs the Board of Directors to undertake the following actions associated with investigation of the feasibility of development of a Community Center program as generally described in the Neighborhood Mission Rejuvenation Plan document presented to the congregation on April 14, 2024:

- I. Performance of following feasibility analyses:
 - A. Identify interested potential Primary Service Providers and associated services, and obtain and assess proposals
 - B. For each identified Primary Servicer Provider determined to be potentially feasible by the Board, develop the following:
 - 1. Program Feasibility Assessment budget (these are costs such as architectural studies needed to complete following steps) along with immediate Fundraising Plan designed to limit Bethlehem contribution to no more than \$5,000 from the endowment fund for the feasibility assessments
 - 2. Proposed Community Center Primary Service operating budget
 - 3. Proposed Bethlehem Facility Plan, consisting of:
 - a. Architectural plans for necessary renovations for proposed program
 - b. Description of proposed use of designated Bethlehem-only or shared space for all key Church needs
 - c. Capital budget for required renovations
 - 4. Proposed Community Center entity operating budget
 - 5. Proposed Combined Bethlehem/Primary Service Provider Fundraising Campaign plan with following elements:
 - 1. Program descriptions of Community Center and associated Key Services to be provided
 - 2. Fundraising Campaign proposed budget to meet operating and capital budget needs outlined above
 - 3. Preliminarily research and set proposed fundraising goals by major donor types (Foundations; Corporations; Individuals, etc.) for:
 - a. Key Service Provider operations
 - b. Bethlehem Facility renovation

II. If the Board determines, after performance of above analyses, that a proposed program appears feasible, the Board is directed to develop a summary presentation of the information analyzed above for Bethlehem Congregation membership, in partnership with the Primary Service Provider. Performance of actual program development steps to initiate proposed plans presented will require a separate authorization vote of Bethlehem Congregation membership at some time after this presentation.

Considerable discussion followed the motion being introduced. After due consideration, the above-stated passed on a show of hands.

There being no additional business, Pastor Ben closed the Assembly with prayer and the meeting was adjourned at 11:47 AM.

THE BETHLEHEM COMMUNITY CENTER COMMITTEE

During the Nov. 17 voters meeting, the Bethlehem Community Center Committee reported on training with Sacred Places of Indiana which could lead to substantial grants needed to assess and update our facility. As part of that process, we need to compile our church's Asset Based Community Development list, which includes positives as individuals and a congregation. The committee members compiled about 75 items during our training and asks for the congregation's help on more.

Following our Jan. 12 Sunday service, we ask members to meet in the cafeteria to discuss our list and add to it. From individuals, we are looking at the categories Heart (something cared deeply about), Hands (skills), and Head (something we know). As a congregation, the categories are Associations, Institutions, Economic, Stories, Physical, and Individuals.

As an example, under the Economic category, committee members have already listed financial acumen (lack of debt), the endowment fund, grant opportunities, city non-profit entities, foundations, location and service organizations.


What are some assets unique to us?
