From the Pastor's Desk



The Light That Cannot Be Hidden

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. Isaiah 60:1

Dear Saints of Bethlehem,

As we turn the calendar to a new year, the glow of Christmas still lingers in our hearts. The joy of Christ's birth—the Word made flesh—fills us with hope and peace. He is the answer to every longing heart, the deep desire of every nation. It was such a joy to celebrate the Advent and Christmas season with you! But the season of Epiphany comes quickly, as wise men arrive from the East, and it calls us to something more. The light of Christ that shone in Bethlehem is not meant to stay tucked away in a manger or confined to the walls of our sanctuary. It is a light for the whole world.

Epiphany is the season of spreading light. It's the season that reminds us Jesus is the Savior not just for a select few but for all people, Jew and Gentile alike. The Magi traveled from far-off lands to worship Him, and their journey reflects the call for Christ's light to spread into the darkest corners of the earth. The light that shone over Bethlehem now shines in us, His Church.

Isaiah's words call us to "arise" and "shine" because God's light has dawned upon us. But how do we shine? Not by our own strength or effort, but by reflecting the light of Christ. Think about the moon—it has no light of its own but shines brightly in the night sky because it reflects the light of the sun. In the same way, we reflect the light of Jesus in a dark world through our words, actions, and love for others.

This new year brings fresh opportunities to live as bearers of Christ's light. Perhaps it's reaching out to a neighbor, serving in a new way, or sharing the hope we have in Jesus with someone who feels lost or forgotten. Even small acts of kindness—like a word of encouragement or a prayer for someone in need—become sparks of Christ's love that spread far beyond what we can see. You and I know plenty of people who need that. Just like the wise men wandering toward something they didn't quite understand, there are many who are seeking Christ without knowing who He is. Their hearts ache for what Jesus brings but they just don't know where to look to see Him. How can we shine His light so that all may know His goodness and love?

As we begin 2025, let's keep our eyes fixed on the One who is the Light of the world. His light will never fade or fail, no matter how dark the days may seem. And as His people, we are called to carry that light into every place God sends us. We each have our corners of the world where we can shine. May God make those places obvious to you. May He give you the courage to begin reflecting His light in those same places. May the glory of the Lord shine brightly in and through you this Epiphany season and always.

We provided food to 410 individuals. They included 173 children under the age of 18, and 53 individuals over the age of 60. Our congregation provided 1241# of food. We went to Community Harvest four times this month to purchase 2428# of food in the amount of \$1194. The Irwin School donated 1390# of food! Our 15 volunteers gave 118 hours of their time.

We could use soup, pasta sauce and tomato products. Thanks to ALL of you for all your many volunteer hours, dedication and the financial support you give to help provide this mission at Bethlehem.

Dear Bethlehem Family,

For the December Messenger, I wrote a fairly impassioned, strongly worded piece expressing personal views on both overseas and local missions. But I should have considered the many ways in which Bethlehem Congregation is truly a light and continuing in many ways to be a presence right where we are in our neighborhood, in spite of the fact that we are fewer in numbers of actual participating members, both because we are an aging congregation and also because over the last number of years we have lost many younger families who have moved to what they have considered safer areas of the city and outlying areas of Fort Wayne. They have also taken their tithes and children with them. This is just a fact of life, and of course has affected the number of children who attend our church and are students in our combined school, Lutheran South Unity School. For many years of its existence, we have been the biggest financial supporter of OUR school, because have considered it an outreach into the south-side community! We also have fewer volunteers to chip in and actively help in many ways. But we still have a big, aging building to maintain, and even many of our attempts to share our beautiful building with many different floor levels are problematic because of its lack of accessibility!

Pastor Ben, whom the Lord sent us almost 5 years ago, has been a strong encouraging leader and spends 4 mornings a week connecting with the students at LSUS; so he has been a great support to our school! It's very obvious he believes strongly in the importance of providing a Christian, grace-based Lutheran presence on the south side of our city! All this is to say that, while I have much passion for all forms of outreach and missions: overseas, local and neighborhood, my body can no longer support those strong passions. So I ask for forgiveness for any of our still active, committed leaders and members who are doing their absolute best to keep our church a vital part of our community, for any hurt or offense I may have caused you! That said, following are the Prayer requests I ask you to consider in your private, family, and small group prayer times!

Mission Prayers for January Updates:

Pray for the many school families who attended the LSUS Christmas program, JOURNEY TO THE MANGER, presented on December 17 at Bethlehem, and continue to pray for all the fine faculty and staff who serve at OUR school! While we weren't able to attend it, we did get to attend the Children's Village one at Lutheran Life Village South Anthony this morning, and it was a real JOY to see all those little ones eagerly participating! It was Chaplain Mike Wakeland's final time to lead this before retiring, and he will be much missed, for sure! Pray also for those children and families touched by this neighboring outreach mission! And while we are at it, Joe Boway has asked us all to be praying for the children in the rural Lutheran schools your gifts started, who were baptized during and after their big Reformation conference, in spite of bad roads and long distances many had to travel!

Praise God the set of "Shi" Bible stories from Exodus has been completed! Pray the Holy Spirit will use this powerful set of stories to deepen faith in the many "Shi" people in Southeast Asia.

Pray also for the Lord's protection over the "Slhi" Bible story team as they travel to villages to distribute the new set of stories!


Women of Bethlehem Game Day

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting November 12, 2024

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: none Guests: none

The October 8th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:30 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Psalms 118:14, "The Lord is my strength and my defense; he has become my salvation." Slow down, take a deep breath, and remember that He is always with us. Allow the Lord to guide our decisions. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's October, 2024 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Dan Bates.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its November meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the death of Leona Beckmann on October 18, 2024.

Brian Bates presented the October Financial Report. Monthly offerings for October were \$19,434 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. \$30,000 was also transferred from the Endowment Fund to the Operating Fund. Monthly expenses for October totaled \$34,137, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of October was \$1,340,759. The balance reflected the September ending balance in the funds held with the Lutheran Foundation as the more recent statement had not yet been received. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$25,293. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through the first ten months of the year, we have expended 84 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Rachele Dance.

Pastor's report included a presentation of the dates and times for Advent, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services; a discussion of the status of the Music Director position vacancy as it appears our current candidate is not likely to fill the position; and a discussion of the need to upgrade some of the AV equipment. Pastor will further research some options with regard to the latter item.

John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. Four members of the Committee – Barb Netterville, Mark Blessing, Blake Sebring and John Stafford attended the second day-long Sacred Places workshop on October 26th. Mark Blessing will provide an update of the Committee's activities during the November 17th Voters Assembly. Members of the Committee will also be meeting the Board of Building and Grounds to update them on the Sacred Places program and grant opportunities.

Brian Bates presented a draft of the 2025 Operating Budget for the Board's consideration. Modest increases were made to several line items based on the Board's review and discussion. With those modifications, the 2025 budget includes proposed income from offerings of \$322,000 and an Endowment Fund withdrawal of \$82,019 to support the budgeted expenses. Total proposed expenses are \$404,019. It was noted that the amount proposed to be withdrawn from the Endowment is likely to approximate the Endowment earning anticipated in 2025. The proposed budget, as modified, was recommended to be presented to the Voters Assembly on November 17th on a motion by John Stafford and a second by Dan Bates. The motion passed unanimously.

The Board next reviewed the proposed agenda for the upcoming Voters Assembly. No changes were made from the agenda as had previously been printed in the weekly bulletin.

There were no items considered under new business.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 8:07 PM.


What are the physical assets of our congregation?
