From the Pastor's Desk

The Kingdom, Not Just the Church"

When Jesus began His public ministry, His first sermon was short and simple: "The Kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the Gospel" (Mark 1:15). He didn't say, "The Church is at hand." He said, "The Kingdom." That's not just a difference in vocabulary—it's a difference in vision.

I've been reflecting on this a lot since my recent visit to Bethany Lutheran Church in Detroit. What struck me most wasn't just what they were doing—but how they were thinking. Their ministry wasn't centered around the success of one church building or one

program or one reputation. It was Kingdom-minded. They were dreaming bigger than their property lines. And honestly, it convicted me—in the best possible way.

Too often, we think about ministry in terms of our church: our Sunday attendance, our budget, our calendar, our building. And there's nothing wrong with caring for those things—they matter. But when we limit the mission of God to the maintenance of the institution, we've already lost the plot. God's Kingdom is not limited to what happens inside these walls. It is not limited to our zip code, our comfort zone, or our congregation. It's breaking in all around us—just like Jesus said it would.

The Kingdom of God is His reign—His rule—in hearts, homes, neighborhoods, and nations. It's what we pray for when we say, "Thy Kingdom come." It's what we long for when we see brokenness in our city. It's what we taste at the Lord's Table. It's what we prepare for as we wait for Christ's return.

So here's the question I've been wrestling with: Are we thinking too small? Are we shrinking the size of God's Kingdom to the size of our sanctuary? Are we letting our desire for safety, control, or tradition keep us from stepping out in faith?

Jesus never told us to build a brand. He told us to make disciples. He never said, "Maintain what you've got." He said, "Go." He didn't say, "Keep it safe." He said, "Lose your life for My sake and you'll find it."

If we're serious about being part of the Kingdom, then we must think differently. We must collaborate—not compete—with other churches. We must serve—not simply host—our neighbors. We must see every ministry opportunity not as a way to grow Bethlehem, but to grow the Kingdom. Because at the end of the day, it's not about Bethlehem's name. It's about His.

I wonder what would happen if we started dreaming Kingdom dreams. If we started asking, "What does Fort Wayne need?" instead of "What can we manage?" If we looked at our school building and saw not an empty space, but a Kingdom outpost. If we partnered with others—not just to keep the lights on—but to bring the Light of Christ to places still stuck in darkness.

That kind of vision takes courage. It takes sacrifice. It takes trust. But it's exactly the kind of vision Jesus gave us.

"The Kingdom of God is at hand." That means it's close. It's active. It's on the move. The only question is: Will we join in?

Let's be a people who think bigger. Let's not ask, "What's best for the church?"

Let's ask, "What's best for the Kingdom?"

And then, let's do it.



These devotions just now finishing have had the focus of "Expectations, Contentment, and Hope - Turning to the Lord in every season of life." Men, women, retired church workers and laypersons write these devotions, and they are very meaningful! They've come under the umbrella of Worship Anew, and you can even order it through them to be mailed to your home!

They've come under reason I bring this up here is that the issues, which are in large-print digest form, have very meaningful Scriptures featured to meditate on. 



Strengthening Mental Health in Summer

Summer! Many of us view it as an exciting time to go out and do activities, take vacations, and spend more time outdoors. It can be a time full of excitement and happiness depending how we spend our time. In fact, summer is a great time to invest in lifestyle habits and support your mental health. There is science that points to summer being a time of better mental health.

How the Summer Affects Mental Health

One of the main ways the summer can help with mental health is through the sunshine. Because of the warmer weather, many of us spend more time outdoors in the summer, plus the sun is out for longer than in other seasons. The increased sun exposure boosts our vitamin D levels, and can even improve mood, leading to better mental health. Spending time in the sun also helps your body produce more melatonin (sleep hormone) at night, allowing you to sleep better and overall feel better.

While there are some stressors unique to summer, such as feeling overwhelmed by the amount of activities and getting less sleep, it is a good time for most people's mental health. Therefore, it is a good time to set habits and prepare for the coming months that are colder and less energizing.

Forming Habits

<u>Set boundaries.</u> You don't have to say yes to every opportunity you are presented with. Seek out the activities and plans that seem the best to you and take breaks when you need them.

<u>Set a sleep schedule.</u> Maintaining a consistent sleep schedule can help ensure you get adequate sleep. One possible way to do this is by sleeping with the sun – don't stay up for too long once it is dark outside.

Engage in physical activity. Improving your physical health can have great benefits on your mental health. With the warmer weather comes more opportunities for outdoor exercise and play. Set a standard for how active you are now so that you will more likely find ways to stay active moving forward.







Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting June 10, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack, David Schult and John Stafford Members absent: Brian Bates Guests: Dena Schult

The June regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:34 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Hebrews 12: 2 – the differences between guilt and shame. Jesus walks toward shame and not away from it. In Christ, shame does not get the final word, redemption does. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's May, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Dan Bates.

The Soul Accounting report as forwarded from the Board of Elders included the May 10, 2025 death of Deb Christensen and the May 25, 2025 receiving of Mark Vosmeier as a new member.

In Treasurer Brian Bates' absence, Greg presented the May Financial Report. Monthly income for May was \$35,512 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Income from offerings through the first five months of the year totaled \$141,086 and total income including miscellaneous receipts and extraordinary income totaled \$161,601. Monthly expenses for May totaled \$30,211, compared with monthly budget amount of \$30,744. Expenses for the year through May totaled \$160,967. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of May was \$1,353,471. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through April as we had not yet received the May statement. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$24,570. Greg also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through May, we expended 39.84 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report as submitted by Brian was unanimously adopted on a motion by Greg Shediack and a second by Rachele Dance.

Pastor's report provided a review of the end of the LSUS school year, with the last couple of weeks being conducted at Bethlehem due to plumbing back-up issues at the LSUS facility. He noted that LSUS did send janitorial staff to Bethlehem to complete clean-up of the spaces used by the school. Pastor also reviewed the plans for the Summer Clubhouse to return to Bethlehem this year after an absence of several years. The funding for this program has changed since they last used our facility and biblical teaching can now be included in the program under the new funding arrangements. The Clubhouse will run from June 16th through July 18th.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring, and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. The grant application to Sacred Places is nearly ready for submission and the request will be for the items as presented at the Voters Assembly. The application will be for approximately \$66,000 and, if we are successful, we will need to raise \$1 dollar in match for every \$2 awarded by Sacred Places. Blake provided an update on upcoming meetings with individuals/groups that continue to express interest in partnering with us.

The Board next reviewed the discussions which took place at the June 1st Voters Assembly, particularly focusing on the next steps to implement the Mission, Vision and Values statements adopted at the Assembly. It was noted that this responsibility would primarily fall to the Board of Directors and the Board of Elders and the need to coordinate proposed activities with those planned for the 100th Anniversary.

Lastly, Pastor presented a request from Matt's Rack to relocate from Concordia Lutheran High School to Bethlehem. This program provides used uniforms to Lutheran school students. Their use of space at Bethlehem would be of low impact. The Board asked Pastor to move forward in accommodating this request.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:45 PM.
