From the Pastor's Desk

Seed, Water, and Mission

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it.—Isaiah 55:10–11

Our mission: Proclaiming Christ. Nurturing Faith. Restoring Hope.

Our vision: Bethlehem Lutheran Church is a catalyst for Gospel transformation in southeast Fort Wayne, where all people experience Christ's love, grow in faith, and restore hope together.

We have a new mission and vision as a congregation, and I want to say clearly: this is not just a nice plan. This is a planting. A seed has gone into the soil. God has spoken a Word over us. And just like Isaiah says, His Word is not going to return empty. It's going to do something. It's going to grow. So the question is not, "Do we like the plan?" or even, "Can we accomplish it?" The better question is: Are we ready for what God is going to grow through this? Isaiah gives us this beautiful image: rain and snow falling from heaven, soaking into the ground, making it sprout and flourish. A seed becomes wheat. Wheat becomes bread. Bread becomes life. All because water came down. That's what God's Word does. When He speaks, it's not empty. It brings life. It transforms hearts. It produces fruit we often never see coming. Now, we don't control the rain. We don't command the harvest. We don't make the seed grow. Our role is to receive what God has given—to plant faithfully, water generously, and wait expectantly. This isn't just a church program. It's a field. And it's time to work.

Proclaiming Christ

Every seed starts with the Word. Not just a word about what to do, but a Word about who we belong to. "Proclaiming Christ" means we center everything on Jesus—His death and resurrection, His grace and truth, His love for this broken world. Not just in sermons or Bible study, but in conversations, in prayers, in the quiet witness of daily life. It's not about shouting on street corners. It's about showing mercy at work. Offering forgiveness at home. Radiating peace when life is hard. We don't manufacture this message—we echo it. The Word goes out, and God does the work.

Nurturing Faith

Once the seed is planted, it needs care. That's what it means to nurture faith. Faith is a gift, but it doesn't grow on autopilot. It's fed by Scripture, prayer, worship, and community. Faith deepens when we ask questions, when we gather in study, when we pray for each other, when we walk through life together. Think of a garden: left alone, seedlings often dry up or get choked out. But in good soil, with watchful care and steady watering, they thrive. So come to worship. Join a Bible study. Talk about Jesus over coffee. Faith grows in those spaces.

Restoring Hope

If you've ever walked through a field in spring after a hard winter, you know what this looks like. Brown grass. Hard soil. And then—one blade of green. One flower poking through. And suddenly, you realize: everything's changing. That's what hope is like. And our world is starving for it. When we talk about "restoring hope," we're not offering cheap optimism. We're offering resurrection. We're offering Jesus, who walked out of the tomb and promises to make all things new. You restore hope when you sit with someone in grief. When you speak a word that reminds them they're not forgotten. When you support a struggling family. When you forgive. Hope takes root in those small moments. But make no mistake—it grows strong.


TO LIFT UP:







Let's make this month one of action, compassion, and hope. Thank you for being part of this important journey.





The Joyful Corner

The Steady Light of Joy

"You make known to me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are pleasures forevermore."

Psalm 16:11

Joy is often misunderstood as mere happiness. But while happiness can flicker based on circumstances, joy is a steady flame that burns within the heart of those who walk with God. It is not dependent on good news, a stable job, or perfect relationships. Instead, joy is rooted in the unchanging presence of God.

David, the writer of Psalm 16, understood this well. Despite the pressures of leadership, threats to his life, and deep personal failures, he could still declare, "In your presence there is fullness of joy." Joy, for him, was not a fleeting emotion but a deep assurance that God was with him and for him.

When we anchor our joy in the presence of God, we find a strength that carries us through trials. It becomes the music in our silence, the hope in our waiting, and the light in our darkness. This kind of joy isn't loud or boastful—it's quiet, resilient, and deeply rooted in trust.

- What is the difference between joy and happiness in your own life?
- Have you experienced joy even during difficult seasons? What sustained it?
- How can you cultivate more time in God's presence to experience the "fullness of joy"?

Lord, thank You for the gift of joy that goes deeper than circumstances. Help me to seek Your presence daily, where true joy is found. Teach me to rest in You and to carry that quiet assurance into every part of my life. Amen.

Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting May 13, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake

The May regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:30 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion discussing the power of the Lord to provide opportunities for Bethlehem Lutheran Church and our need to prepare for these opportunities. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's April, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Dan Bates.

There were no items this month in the Soul Accounting report as forwarded from the Board of Elders.

Brian Bates presented the April Financial Report. Monthly income for April was \$28,215 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Income from offerings through the first four months of the year totaled \$105,868 and total income including miscellaneous receipts and extraordinary income totaled \$126,090. Monthly expenses for April totaled \$30,211, compared with monthly budget amount of \$33,668. Expenses for the year through April totaled \$130,223. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of April was \$1,347,765. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through March as we had not yet received the April statement. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$24,598. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through April, we expended 32.23 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Blake Sebring.

Pastor's report provided a review of the Easter Week services; an update on the progress of his Doctor of Ministry classes; and an update on the building situation at Lutheran South Unity School. The school building experienced a significant sewer backup causing damage to some furniture and fixtures as well as necessitating a serious cleaning operation. As a result, the students will finish the school year at Bethlehem. The last day of school will be on May 21st.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring, Mark Blessing and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. Since the last Board update, Committee members have meet with two additional individuals/groups that have expressed interest in partnering with us. Mark also reviewed the draft of a listing of sought attributes and preferences from the perspective of Bethlehem that we can use in interaction with groups with which we are in discussion. The Board reacted favorably to the draft as presented. It was further suggested that we provide an update, including the list of sought attributes and preferences at the June 1st Voters Assembly.

Mark updated the Board on the building assessment which has been completed. The preliminary report indicated that the most immediate needs were for some minor roofing and masonry repairs. We are awaiting the consultant's final report. We have an opportunity to apply for a grant of up to \$75,000 from Sacred Places (the same organization which provided the grant to fund the building assessment). The deadline for application is June 15th. Given that before making any final decision on the specific projects to include in this application, we would like to review the consultant's final report. Since the application falls before the next Board meeting, John Stafford moved that the Board give the President the authority to approve a grant application to Sacred Places, for the June 15th grant application window, for a request of up to \$75,000 to address capital projects as identified in the building assessment. The motion was seconded by David Schult and passed unanimously.

The Board next discussed a proposed agenda for the June 1st Voters Assembly. In addition to the regular items (approval of minutes and presentation of the treasurer's report), we would include a presentation of a proposed Bethlehem Vision, Mission and Values Statement; the proposed amendment to the Bylaws regarding eliminating tenure limitations on Board service; an update from the Community Center Committee and an update from the 100th Anniversary Committee.

Under new business, the Board discussed the need for having the organ tuned. Brian noted that this was a budgeted expense. Arrangements will be made for the tune up. Pastor Ben informed the Board that the Summer Clubhouse would be returning to Bethlehem this year (it had been discontinued as a result of COVID). All expenses will be covered by the Clubhouse. It will be here from June 16th through July 18th.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Rachele Dance seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 8:07 PM.

Agenda will be forthcoming but will include an amendment to the constitution and our mission, vision and values to be approved.

The Board of Directors proposes the following amendment to the Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Constitution and Bylaws for consideration at the next Voters Assembly (tentatively scheduled for Sunday, June 1, 2025): Removal of the following section:

Chapter III – Officers and Board of Directors

A. 3. Tenure

No director may serve more than three (3) consecutive terms without a break of at least one (1) year of service, except the Senior Pastor. If a director serves one year or more of an unexpired term, that service shall count as one term. If a director serves less than one year of an unexpired term, that service shall not count as a term.

The Board is offering this proposal in light of the increasing difficulty of finding members of the congregation willing to serve on the Board of Directors.
