## From the Pastor's Desk



## **Finding Our Rhythm Again**

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven." - Ecclesiastes 3:1

Does anyone else feel like 2025 has been a little off? Maybe it's just me, but I can't seem to settle into any kind of rhythm. The moment I think I've found my footing, something throws it all off again—federal holidays, weather delays, school cancellations, sickness running rampant in my home and at school. It's been one thing after another, and I know I'm not the only one feeling it. Please tell me I'm not the only one!

We are creatures of habit. Predictability is comfortable for most. We settle into routines, and when those get disrupted, it throws everything off balance. Maybe you've felt it too—that sense that the days are getting away from you, that you're always playing catch-up, that things just aren't clicking like they should. And when life feels unsteady, it's easy to drift spiritually too. Prayer gets squeezed out. Worship becomes optional. The weeks blur together, and suddenly, we feel disconnected—from God, from one another, even from ourselves.

And then comes Lent. Right on time.

Most of us pastors shudder at the sight of it showing up on our calendars but I honestly am craving it. One of the great gifts of the liturgical calendar is that it gives us a rhythm—a way of marking time that isn't controlled by our schedules or obligations, but by Christ. And Lent, in particular, is a season that slows us down and reorients us. It's a reset. A realignment. A time when we step into a rhythm given to us rather than one we try to force on our own.

This rhythm is not meant to be a burden but a gift. The extra worship services, the disciplines of prayer and fasting, the intentional reflection—all of it is designed to pull us out of the chaos of life and place us firmly where we belong: with Christ, in His Word, among His people. Walking at His pace. St. Augustine once said, "You have made us for Yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in You." That restlessness we feel? That disjointed, unsettled, off-balance feeling? It's a sign that we need to be re-centered in Him.

So I'm taking my time this month to encourage you to join me—step into the rhythm of Lent this year. Do all the things you've grown accustomed to and don't be afraid to start some new traditions. Don't let this season pass you by. Let it be the thing that steadies you, that brings you back to what matters most. Make worship a priority. Set aside time for prayer. Engage the season together at Bethlehem. Not because it's just another thing to do, but because this is how God resets us—by bringing us back, again and again, to His presence.

May God bless us all as we enter into this most holy season, where Christ walks the road we could not walk, bears the sin we could not bear, and gives the life we could not earn—all so that we might be made new in Him.

Lent is here. And with it, the invitation to find our rhythm again.

We went to Community Harvest three times this month to purchase 1,721# of food in the amount of \$599. Our 158 volunteers gave 91 hours of their time.

## Bethlehem Mission News

As I write this on Monday, February 24, Joe Boway's work and travel partner, Jon Frank, from the Tri-Cities (Saginaw, Bay City, and Midland), Michigan area, begins his trip from Flint. Since he's a Frank from that Bavarian immigration part of my home town area, I'm wondering if he might be at least distant cousin of our dear Ren Frank, teacher and music director for many years at Bethlehem. Ren was from Frankenmuth, and close by there was also Frankentrost and Frankenlust! Anyway, Jon Frank will be working on a construction project with Joe at the Gaye Town Lutheran School and then travel by roads and MAF Cessna plane to other rural schools to visit classrooms. Then they both will fly back to the capital city of Monrovia on March 6, and then both start their trips back to the US on March 8. Please continue prayers for Joe's wife Glendora and sons Joe Jr and Joshua during Joe's absence! And pray for Joe and Jon in both their road and plane travels, for safety in the construction process and for productive and encouraging visits to the rural Lutheran schools to visit and give encouragement to the teachers and students!

In latter January we got an update from Joe and Suzy Schlie with Cru Arts and Culture. I quote here an opening statement and Scripture from Joe: "As we enter our 36th and 32nd years of ministry with Cru, we cannot help but give thanks for God's gracious hand to us through you. The Apostle Paul writes in Philippians 1: "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it out to completion until the day of Jesus Christ." "With that in mind, Suzy is participating with more than 100 people from around the world in a weekly course about prayer. for the next few months, each Tuesday she will join with them in times that will include learning about prayer and practicing prayer. The example of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, where he asked his closest disciples to watch and pray with Him, compels us to ask you to join Suzy and me in praying for her and with her during these days of learning and growth. Also, we have been hearing from some of our former students who have served for many years overseas as missionaries with Cru. Unfortunately, they are having to leave their 2nd country in the past few years because of having their visas cancelled. It is difficult to watch as people are kicked out of their countries of residence. It is scary for them and their children as their local governments use fear and intimidation. Please keep these friends and colleagues in your prayers!" Please join Joe, Suzy and me in praying for these discouraged missionaries and their families as they are forced to leave countries in sensitive, anti-Christian countries, that the Lord would keep them safe and show them the next steps He has for them! And may we all be more committed to stand with them in prayer and intercession!

We also got the latest issue of the "Miller Mailer" - Scripture Engagement Ministry in Southeast Asia - from Tim and Michelle last week. This ministry also takes place in a country that is not open to the Gospel; but there have been encouraging openings to share the Father's love and Word in their heart languages! We had also learned personally from Tim and Michelle that Michelle's dad, Don Kovac, over visiting with them, had come down with RSV and Pneumonia and needed to be taken to Thailand where there was better medical care and the specialists he needed. He is finally out of the woods now; please pray for his continued recovery and strength! Thankfully, his and our oldest granddaughter, Ellyn, has been able to stay and will be able to accompany him back to his home in Florida.

\*Khon Sundays School Training: Pray for wisdom and protection for our Khon SE team as they travel to various provinces to lead 2-day workshops for young teachers and elders. Pray that the new set of 22 stories from Acts will lead to growth in faith, character and added believers of all ages.

\*Southern Training: Pray also as the SE team will lead workshops in using our national language curriculum from the OT to teachers from 20 churches in the south in early March!

\*Bible Project Theme videos: Our media team will continue work on new videos including "The Messiah" and a Gospel of Luke series: pray especially for wisdom in scrip translation and developing skill in various audio and video production efforts.




#### MEN'S PRAYER BREAKFAST MARCH 29

#### **March is Self-Harm Awareness Month**

What does SELF-HARM mean: self-harm or self-mutilation, is the act of deliberately infliction pain and damage to one's own body. Self-harm most often refers to cutting, burning, scratching, and other forms of external injury; it can however, also include internal or emotional harm, such as consuming toxic amounts of alcohol or drugs.

Why People Hurt Themselves: the roots of self-harming behavior are often found in early childhood trauma, including physical, verbal, or sexual abuse. It may also be an indication of other serious mental health issues that are independent of trauma, such as depression, anxiety, or borderline personality disorder.

Who is most likely to Self-Harm: ADULTS least likely only about 5%. TEENS have highest rate about 17%. COLLEGE STUDENTS about 15%. WOMEN vs. MEN women self-harm at least 35% of total cases, men more likely to underreport self-harm. SEXUAL MINORITIES, gay, bi-sexual people are at high risk.

**AGE OF ONSET:** Average age is 13. This represents a time of great physical, social, mental change and development. Also time linked to emergence of MENTAL HEALTH CONDITIIONS like anxiety and depression.

**HOW CAN WE HELP:** Responding with compassion - Recognizing that self-harm is an attempt at coping with painful feelings - is the first step. Next encourage to seek help, assist in finding other outlets of feelings, and make yourself available to listen if needed. There are many HELP organizations in Ft. Wayne and surrounding area.

As in Jonah 4:3-4: "just kill me now Lord! I'd rather be dead than alive in what I predicted will not happen."

The Lord replied, "it is right for you to be angry about this?"

God has said you are allowed to feel every emotion. God is never mad about struggles, BUT come to God when you feel out of control emotionally so He can help you with your heart. He is like a Gardner who pulls weeds in your heart---weeds---that will keep you from growing in faith. Don't be afraid to go to God, He knows your heart better that you do and will perform spiritual heart surgery so your heart can be free to love!!

GOD LOVES US ALL!!!!





\*Main Event - Sunday, September. 27, 2026 Tent service





## The Joyful Corner

## What an Opportunity!

*Serve the LORD with gladness!* (Psalm 100:2a)

Have you had a unique opportunity in your life? Perhaps you have been blessed to attend college, to advance in your job, to travel to a special part of the world on a mission trip, or to use your skills and passion to help people in your community. Opportunity is defined as "a favorable juncture of circumstances," "an occasion or situation which makes it possible to do something, or the possibility of doing something" (Cambridge English Dictionary and Mirriam-Webster.com Dictionary 2018).

Whatever opportunities you have enjoyed, today there is an opportunity for each of us. That opportunity or "possibility of doing something" is Lent! Lent is an opportunity. Lent is a favorable juncture of time where we are given the gift of 40 days to prepare for Easter. This opportunity begins on Ash Wednesday. For 40 weekdays, we pause, remember, and contemplate what God has done and continues to do for us. So, what might be your "opportunity" this Lenten season?

Lent may mean attending Lenten services where we focus on repentance. When we fully repent, God graciously forgives our sins and releases us from the guilt and sorrow our sins cause us. Knowing God forgives our sins for Jesus' sake, we are filled with joy and thanksgiving that leads us to abundant praise and worship for our great God.

Lent may also mean giving up something. Fasting is one such way to do this. In Matthew 6:16–18, Jesus talks about the proper way to fast. For some, giving up a type of food or other item for the Lenten season is a daily and constant reminder for them of Jesus' total sacrifice for us when He gave up His life on the cross to rescue us from sin and eternal death.

But instead of giving up something for Lent, this season can also be an opportunity for each of us to also consider what we can add to our lives that is good. A good addition might be to write notes (40 of them for each day in the Lenten season) to thank people in your life or tell them you are thinking of them and praying for them that day. Another good addition might mean reading a different psalm each day of Lent as your daily prayer. The Lenten season can be an opportunity to rise and shine 15 minutes early and spend the time in God's presence or even give up a 30-minute television show to add more time in His Word. Or motivated by Christ's own acts of kindness and love, you might wish to do an act of kindness for others.

Another something we can add during Lent might be to find items in your home, maybe even 40 of them, to give to a service organization in your community that can give them to help those in need. Or perhaps you could encourage members of your family to share some "out of the normal" nice things with one another. For example, instead of just saying "Thank you" or "Good job," take the opportunity to tell your spouse, "I love how you help with the kids." Or tell your kids, "I love how you work hard on your homework," or "I love how you make others feel they are special."

The Lenten season can be a new opportunity for you, "an occasion to do something" memorable and meaningful. Whether you choose to give up something or choose to add something good, spend time in prayer and thanksgiving as the joyous celebration of Jesus' resurrection approaches. Ask the Holy Spirit to use your Lenten "opportunity" to prepare your heart for Easter in a way that is meaningful and that deepens your relationship with God. Enjoy your opportunity this Lenten season!



Some big wins for Miracle Matthew over the past year include: greater stability with independent sitting and reaching; playing with his feet; using his tongue and mouth to make sounds; saying "Mama"; shaking/nodding his head in response to questions; overall improvement with swallowing & chewing coordination; finding his pointer finger; grasping toys at mid-line with both hands; greater endurance with weight bearing through arms and legs; standing independently for moments, graduating from a 3-week DMI (dynamic movement intervention) therapy intensive in September and TAKING HIS FIRST ASSISTED STEPS while there; gaining up to 6 sign words and using them with his sisters to "tell" and not just respond. And these are just the big ones! We thank God for Matthew's continual progress and are trusting God for Matthew's healing. Please continue to pray for Matthew, his parents and his 3 big sisters who love him dearly!

#### Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting January 14, 2025

The January 14th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:32 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Isaiah 43:1-7; we are God's chosen people and He never forgets us. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's December, 2024 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Dan Bates.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its January meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the baptism of Remington Nelson on December 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2024 and the passing of Regine (Jenny) Guenin on January 6, 2025.

Brian Bates presented the December and Year-End Financial Report. Monthly income for December was \$40,969 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Income for the year was \$465,474 compared with a budgeted amount of \$480,120. This included congregation giving of \$342,326; Endowment Fund withdrawls of \$85,000; SSMG Fund withdrawls of \$37,000; and extraordinary income of \$1,148. Monthly expenses for December totaled \$34,499, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. Expenses for the year were \$467,427 compared with a budgeted amount of \$480,120. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of December was \$1,356,488. The balance reflected the November ending balance in the funds held with the Lutheran Foundation as the more recent statement had not yet been received. The year-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$25,847. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. For the year, we expended 97 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Blake Sebring.

Pastor's report included a review of the various Christmas services; an update noting that the Angel Tree giving supported three families; and an update on his Doctorate of Ministry classes, with this semester including an independent study class.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. The Board reviewed the draft case statement that will be submitted with our funding request to Sacred Places for a building assessment grant. The Board recapped the January 12<sup>th</sup> Asset Mapping exercise conducted with the congregation and reviewed a summary of the event as prepared by Blake. Lastly, it was noted that the Committee would be meeting with several groups in early February which have expressed interest in utilizing space in our facility and with increased interaction with our surrounding neighbors.

Under New Business, the Board discussed recreating a Worship Committee to provide input on components of the Saturday and Sunday services.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:45 PM.
