From the Pastor's Desk



Where Do We Go From Here?

"Behold, I am making all things new." - Revelation 21:5

Easter morning may have passed, but the resurrection still lingers in the air like the scent of lilies after the service. Jesus lives—and because He lives, hope lives too. That means we're not stuck. Not stuck in our sins, not stuck in fear, not stuck in the grave, not stuck in the past. His resurrection gives us room to imagine again. To trust again. To hope again. He is making all things new—and that includes us.

That's why this May, I want to invite you into a hopeful conversation about Bethlehem's future. Not just about what we do—but about who we are, what we value, and where we're headed. These questions are especially important right now as we consider the future of our school building and the kinds of ministry and partnerships that space might host. We want what happens in our building to reflect what God is doing in our hearts and in this neighborhood.

At our upcoming Voters 'Meeting on June 1st, we'll be discussing and approving a proposed mission statement, vision statement, and list of core values. These statements are more than words. They're a way for us to name what's already been shaping our life together and to declare, with resurrection hope, where we believe God is leading us next.

The proposed vision statement is this: Bethlehem Lutheran Church is a catalyst for Gospel transformation in southeast Fort Wayne, where all people experience Christ's love, grow in faith, and restore hope together. And our proposed mission statement is simple but deeply meaningful: Proclaiming Christ. Nurturing Faith. Restoring Hope.

These three phrases capture the heartbeat of our church. *Proclaiming Christ* means we center everything on Jesus. We are grounded in God's Word and the historic Christian faith, and we believe the Gospel is for everyone. Through worship, teaching, and how we live our lives, we want to make the love, mercy, and justice of Jesus visible in both word and deed.

Nurturing faith speaks to how we grow together as a community. Faith isn't a solo journey. At Bethlehem, people of all ages and backgrounds walk with one another, passing on faith across generations. We're committed to building relationships marked by mutual respect and love, where everyone has something to offer and something to learn.

Restoring hope reminds us that God has placed us here—in southeast Fort Wayne—for a purpose. We're not outsiders coming in to fix things. We believe Christ is already at work in this neighborhood, and we are called to join Him. That means engaging in partnerships marked by respect, listening, and mutual transformation—so that together we can seek lasting flourishing.

Along with our mission and vision, we're also proposing a set of values that describe how we seek to live this out. These include being Christ-centered and rooted in God's Word. They reflect our commitment to embodying the Gospel, nurturing faith across all ages, and celebrating the diversity of God's kingdom. They show our belief in collaboration, hope for our neighborhood, and the importance of stewarding our resources for the good of others.

Over the next few weeks, you'll see these statements posted in the bulletin, shared in Bible study, and displayed around the church. I encourage you to read them carefully, reflect on them, and talk about them with others. This is something we are discerning together as a congregation—and I hope you'll join us at the June 1st meeting to affirm these steps forward.

Because the tomb is still empty. Jesus is still alive. And He's still making all things new—even here, even now, even at Bethlehem. With resurrection hope,

He is Risen - Risen Indeed - Alleluia! I write this article early in the first week of Easter, and we sang some Easter hymns this afternoon at the Tuesday Bible Study Bill Ihssen, Jon Anderson and Bob Miller lead down in the Heritage Room each week! Yesterday, of course, the whole world heard the news that Pope Francis, after greeting many people Easter Sunday in St Peter's Square at the Vatican and then riding through the area to show his love and concern, was taken home to his eternal rest on Monday! Pat Burgoon, our 102 year old Roman Catholic concert pianist here at LLV, almost always attends that Tuesday class led by Lutherans, regularly takes turns being organist for Chapel services when she's not playing for her St. Henry's parish, and exhibits the gift of serving and ecumenism that would make Pope Francis happy, I think! Pat herself was a member of a religious order out east before moving here to take care of her mother, who then lived to 108! Pope Francis was probably the most beautiful example of living out his concern for the poor, the disabled, the foreigners and immigrants needing help that our world has seen since Mother Theresa - Showing Jesus's love!

We received an update from Joe Boway, sharing that in Rural Liberia, Easter conference services were being held, offering to baptize parents and children yesterday at those services! He also shared about one of their pre-school teachers, Mrs. Mamie Fayiah in the school in Foya, who has 85 preschoolers in her class! As a retired preschool and Kindergarten teacher myself, I can't even imagine teaching that many little ones at once!

By the time you read this, our granddaughter and new grandson in-law Zack Anderson will have worshipped with and spoken to our congregation in Bethlehem's sanctuary this coming Sunday, April 27! I am thankful they will be speaking in the sanctuary so I can also, God willing, be part of that morning with you all! It will be the last time they visit us here before they return to Southeast Asia in June, and we so much appreciate your prayers for them!

We have a prayer request from Anna Jank, for whom we have often prayed as she has taught English and also shared the Good News to students in her classes. A Chinese follower of Jesus at her school, named Echo, was taken into custody by the Chinese police on Friday, along with a university professor named Gu who is a new follower of Jesus. Gu has been part of a house church where Echo was discipling him. Please pray for Echo and Gu, that Jesus will protect them and give them peace, that they will endure faithfully through any interrogations, and that they will be released. Pray also for protection for all the people in their house church. Thank you for your prayers for the suffering church!

The work of our missionaries is a magnificent expression of the Lord's redeeming love.







The Importance of Mental Health Awareness Month

Each May, Mental Health Awareness Month offers a powerful reminder that mental health is just as vital as physical health. First observed in 1949, this month-long campaign aims to raise awareness, fight stigma, and advocate for policies that support people with mental health conditions.

Why Mental Health Matters

Mental health affects how we think, feel, and act. It influences how we handle stress, relate to others, and make decisions. According to the World Health Organization, one in four people globally will experience a mental health disorder in their lifetime. Yet, despite its prevalence, mental health remains surrounded by stigma, misinformation, and lack of access to care.

Left unaddressed, mental health challenges can lead to serious consequences, including unemployment, substance abuse, homelessness, and even suicide. But with early intervention, support, and education, recovery is possible.

Advocacy efforts focus on improving mental health services, increasing funding, and ensuring equitable access, particularly for marginalized communities.







The Joyful Corner

How to Have Fullness of Joy

Adrian Rogers

The life of a Christian is to be a life of continual, contagious joy; Adrian Rogers says, "Joy is not a nicety in the Christian life; it is an absolute necessity." The fullness of joy is essential to winning the lost to Jesus Christ and bearing life's burdens. The joy of the Lord is our strength. It is how we are able to face the heartaches and trials of life.

"These things I have spoken to you, that My joy may remain in you, and that your joy may be full." John 15:11 The joy of Jesus Christ is abounding and supernatural.

When we put our faith in Him, we don't just get a cheap imitation of His joy—we get all of it. Remember, joy is not happiness; it does not depend on outward circumstances, but on Jesus Christ, who never changes. Joy does not remove the pain, but it helps us bear it.

"Joy is not the subtraction of problems from life; joy is the addition of power to meet those problems." (Adrian Rogers)

Second, the joy of Jesus is an abiding joy; it doesn't come and go—it stays.

We are able to rejoice always, as Scripture implores us to, because the joy of the Lord will not leave in the dark times. This joy is steadfast in sorrow, triumphant in tribulation, lasting in losses, and abundant in affliction. The joy of Jesus is abundant joy.

John 15:5 reveals the secret to joy is *abiding in Jesus*, living a life of surrender and dependence upon Him. Like a branch relies on a vine for its life and fruit, we rely on Jesus for this joy. "As the Father loved Me, I also have loved you; abide in My love." John 15:9

We can rest in knowing that His love and His power are continuous. And when we obey Him, our obedience will be made manifest by the fruit we bear.

Finally, it is a life of rejoicing.

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting April 8, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: David Schult Guests: none

The April regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:31 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Matthew 5:13-16. Let the light of Bethlehem shine on both our congregation and on our surrounding neighbors. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's March, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as corrected, on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Brian Bates.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its April meeting, was reviewed by the Board. It included the death of Waldell Bright on March 10, 2025.

Brian Bates presented the March Financial Report. Monthly income for March was \$27,485 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Income through the first three months of the year totaled \$97,875. Monthly expenses for March totaled \$33,559, compared with monthly budget amount of \$33,668. Expenses for the year through March totaled \$100,012. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of March was \$1,365,846. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through February as we had not yet received the March statement. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$25,383. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through March, we expended 24.75 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

Pastor's report provided an update on the Lenten Services, noting that they have been well attended. Pastor also provided an update on his Doctor of Ministry program. He will be visiting two predominately African-American Lutheran congregations this summer as a part of his studies. They include Bethany Lutheran Church in Detroit (Pastor Chris Bodley) and Bethlehem Lutheran Church in St. Louis (Pastor Dr. Gerard Bolling). Lastly, he noted that he has and will continue to be working with both Kasey Hapner and Janelle Deal on updating the musical component of our worship services.

Pastor Ben, Blake Sebring and John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. We have been approved for a \$23,500 grant from the Sacred Places program to undertake a building assessment. We have engaged the architectural firm of Design Collaborative who will be teaming with ISES Corporation, a subcontractor from Atlanta, to prepare the assessment. The Committee met in March with several non-profit organizations serving youth in our community. The Committee also met to create a series of points better defining the expectations of Bethlehem as we pursue partner/s for this initiative.

Pastor provided a Lutheran South Unity School update. The HVAC work is underway in their building. Bethlehem will be hosting the LSUS Arts and Music Festival on May 2nd.

Under New Business, the Board voted to dedicate the Lenten Service offerings to the Bethlehem Food Bank on a motion by Evans Branigan and a second by Dan Bates. The motion passed unanimously.

The Board also voted to present to the next Voters Assembly a motion to remove Section A-3 of Chapter III in the Bethlehem Constitution and Bylaws. This section currently states that no Board of Directors member may serve more than three consecutive terms without a break of at least one year. The motion was made by John Stafford and seconded by Blake Sebring. It was noted that it has become increasingly difficult to find members willing to serve on the Board. The motion passed unanimously. The proposal will be presented at the next Voters Assembly, tentatively set for the first Sunday in June.

The Board continued consideration of proposed Bethlehem revised Vision, Mission and Values Statements, along with benchmarks for their active implementation by the congregation. The Board will continue its review at its May meeting with a goal of being able to present them for consideration to the Voters Assembly in June.

Lastly, the Board members expressed their thankfulness for Evans' return to Board meetings after a recent absence due to health issues.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Rachele Dance seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 8:05 PM.

Voters' assembly June 1st.

Agenda will be forthcoming but will include an amendment to the constitution and our mission, vision and values to be approved.

The Board of Directors proposes the following amendment to the Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Constitution and Bylaws for consideration at the next Voters Assembly (tentatively scheduled for Sunday, June 1, 2025): Removal of the following section:

Chapter III – Officers and Board of Directors

A. 3. Tenure

No director may serve more than three (3) consecutive terms without a break of at least one (1) year of service, except the Senior Pastor. If a director serves one year or more of an unexpired term, that service shall count as one term. If a director serves less than one year of an unexpired term, that service shall not count as a term.

The Board is offering this proposal in light of the increasing difficulty of finding members of the congregation willing to serve on the Board of Directors.
