## From the Pastor's Desk



## Our True Hope in a Divided World

I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. - Ephesians 4:1-3

Here we are again—wrapping up yet another election season. The ads, the debates, the endless headlines. It feels like the whole world is pulling us into different corners, demanding that we choose a side, align with a cause, or fight for a victory. It's easy to get wrapped up in

it, isn't it? But while elections matter and civic engagement is important, they aren't our ultimate hope. And try as they may, they shouldn't define us. As Christians, our true identity is found in Christ alone. In the wake of our Reformation celebration, I wanted to use the confessions to guide this conversation of politicization in the church. The Lutheran Confessions remind us that, while we're part of this world, our citizenship is ultimately in heaven. The Augsburg Confession, in Article XVI, talks about how Christians are to respect government and obey laws—unless, of course, they command us to sin. What this means is that we're called to engage in the world, but we don't belong to it. Our first loyalty is to Christ. He is our King.

In this divided season, it's easy to let politics shape how we see ourselves and others. But the Confessions point us to something so much bigger than winning elections or proving points. In Article IV of The Apology of the Augsburg Confession, we're reminded that our faith centers on grace. We're justified not by what we do, how we vote, or how convincing our arguments are, but by God's grace alone. And that grace isn't just for us—it's for everyone. This is our identity, and it's what we're called to extend to others, especially those we disagree with.

Luther's explanation of the Eighth Commandment in The Large Catechism really speaks to us here, too. He urges us to speak well of our neighbor and explain their actions in the kindest way. This is hard, especially in the heat of political tension. But Christ calls us to a different way. Not to tear down those who think differently, but to build up, to love, and to see them as fellow image-bearers of God.

And here's the good news: Thank God our unity doesn't depend on our politics. Our unity is built on something much stronger—Jesus. Article VII of the Augsburg Confession tells us that the church's unity is rooted in the gospel and the sacraments. Our shared identity is in Christ, not in political parties or platforms. This means we can stand together, even when we disagree, because Christ is what binds us. He is our hope. As Philippians 3:20 reminds us, "our citizenship is in heaven." That's the truth we hold onto in this election season—and every season. No matter what happens politically, our true King has already won the victory. And in Him, we have an unshakable identity, a lasting hope, and an eternal home.

So as this election and its aftermath unfold, let's remember who we are. We can be light bringers in a time of derision and division. Let's be a church that reflects the heart of Jesus, where everyone—regardless of political views—finds a place of love, respect, and peace. Let's be a church that holds on to the right things while rejecting those things that oppose the values and mission of the Kingdom of God. Our hope is not in politics but in Christ, and through Him, we're called to shine His light in a world desperate for peace and unity. Blessings to you this month as you participate in democracy and live with its results. We are citizens of a country, with all the rights and responsibilities that come with it, but our citizenship is ultimately in heaven and all that that entails must always come first.

We provided food to 347 individuals. They included 162 children under the age of 18, and 50 individuals over the age of 60.

Our congregation provided 307# of food. We went to Community Harvest four times this month to purchase 2927# of food in the amount of \$1291.

Our 17 volunteers gave 110 hours of their time.

We could use broth, tuna, pasta sauce, peanut butter and diced tomatoes.

## **Missions**

Southeast Asia is one of the missions we support here at Bethlehem. It is an area of Asia that consists of eleven countries that include Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Japan, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam. These countries cover an area of over 1.7 million miles with a population of about 673 million inhabitants. There are many different languages and dialects spoken in Southeast Asia with remote and fragmented regions especially noticeable in language diversity.

Tim and Michelle Miller are missionaries who have been called for more than 25 years to bring the Good News of our Lord to remote regions of people who want to learn and build a relationship with God. Most recently we have supported Tim and Michelle Miller in their work to translate and 2 distribute Bible stories as audio recordings in the Shi language. Their goal is to develop 100 oral Bible stories as a foundation for understanding the Gospel from Creation through Christ and the birth of the Church. In addition, another area of missions we support is the Khon Southeast team. They have completed stories from Genesis, Exodus and Luke into the national language for Khon Sunday school lessons.

We are blessed and humbled to help financially support our missionaries in their work to bring the word of God to ethnic groups in remote and fragmented areas of Southeast Asia.

## Bethlehem Mission News

A few of our missionaries have begun trips, and we would like to be praying for them during their journeys! Joe Boway began his very busy trip to visit the churches in rural Liberia on October 14. At first he had trouble getting out of Chicago and then almost missed his connection in Brussels, Belgium. But thankfully, both Joe and all his luggage he was taking made it! Then they were not able to use their simpler transportation of a small Cessna plane, needing to take very rough roads! But they finally arrived in the Foya district, where this week he has been visiting classrooms in the morning and meeting with teachers and church leaders in the afternoons and evenings! On October 25th (I am writing this article on the 23rd), He will leave by the rough roads again to travel to the capital city of Monrovia to meet with church leaders and make arrangements for transporting building and school supplies to rural Liberia. On October 31, Reformation Day, Joe will fly to southeastern rural Liberia on a Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) Cessna aircraft! We are asked to pray for all the all the children, pastors and church members traveling to the Reformation Conference, and also ask the Lord to be present and to bless the fellowship of Believers as they gather, as well as to bless all the pastors, teachers and lay-leaders as they share the Truth of God's Word at this conference! On November 3rd, All Saints Day celebration, they expect many baptisms in rural Liberia during the Reformation Conference, and ask us to rejoice with them as they welcome these new members into God's family! Once again, Joe asks for prayers for wisdom as he visits classrooms and meets with teachers and leaders. And as always, he asks us for protection for Glendora,, Joe Jr. and Joshua while Joe is away, and especially for Joshua as he celebrates his 15th birthday on October 30! Joe asks for safe travel back to Monrovia on November 7 and then back to Fort Wayne on November 10/11!

Joe thanks God for YOU, our partners, who have helped the Liberian Children's Ministry meet the physical, educational and spiritual needs of the children of Liberia in order to give them real hope for the future - hope that is only found in Christ Jesus! Ask the Lord to speak to Joe's heart and give him a clear vision of future plans for the Liberian Children's Ministry. Please use this above shortened prayer calendar to pray for all these needs for Joe's very important mission trip he has already begun!

Meanwhile, I saw today on Facebook that Todd Roeske has begun one of his LCMS Mission trips to the Philippines and other parts of Asia to visit and encourage churches that have been planted in the past! I don't have a timeline for when he will be where; but he would appreciate our prayers for his travels! Many of you remember that we supported Todd, Kim and their daughters as they served for many years in the Philippines and then Alaska! They came to speak many times, and now Todd is a parish pastor in the state of Washington. But he is still sent out to encourage the churches in Asia, just as St. Paul and the Apostles did in the time of the early Church!

Finally, if you have any time left for more missionary prayers, please pray for the Children of the Persecuted Church! Throughout the world, children are targeted because they and their parents follow Jesus. Let's spend some time praying for the youngest voices facing persecution. Open Doors tells us that when children are discriminated against at school, they can be at risk of dropping out or renouncing their faith in Jesus. PLEASE PRAY 2 Timothy 1:7 over them: "For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline!"

NEVER underestimate the importance and power of being the ones praying from home for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God! God bless you as you take on this important task that Jesus gave us all!

There is a \$5.00 suggested donation to help cover the costs of books.




## THE BETHLEHEM COMMUNITY CENTER COMMITTEE

The Bethlehem Community Center Committee continues to meet and study potential future options for the building. Members recently met with representatives of the Dana Causey Foundation, Angela Moellering of Lutheran Social Services, Trisha LaRowe of Neighborhood Health and visited with Javier Mondragon, CEO of Bridge of Grace.

Committee members have also started a six-month training program with Sacred Places of Indiana which will provide input and guidance for building a plan to move forward. The program will also make the church eligible for grants, including to pay for a necessary and substantial building engineering assessment.

The committee members are Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Greg Shediack, Barb Netterville, Blake Sebring, John Stafford, Mark Blessing, Peter Schlie and Kim Brooks. We continue to move judiciously, praying for God's guidance and discernment to know His plans for us. We will regularly provide updates in the Messenger.

## Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting September 10, 2024

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Rachele Dance, Natalie Reynolds, Bake Sebring, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: Dan Bates Guests: none

The September 10th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:33 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Psalm 46, we should not be anxious as God is ever present, the God of Jacob is our fortress. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The Board first considered the vacancy on the Board created with the transfer of Caleb DeMond. This is an At-Large Board position. John Stafford moved that Blake Sebring fill the remainder of the term. The motion was seconded by Brian Bates and was passed unanimously. The term of this position runs through December, 2025. It was noted that per the bylaws this action of the Board will need to be presented to the congregation at the next Voters Assembly for its ratification.

The Soul Accounting report, as approved by the Board of Elders at its September meeting was reviewed by the Board. John Nahrwold was received by transfer on August 19th. Dishondra Johnson transferred to Holy Cross on August 19<sup>th</sup> and that Caleb and Summer DeMond and daughter Olivia transferred to Redeemer on September 3<sup>rd</sup>.

The minutes from the Board's August, 2024 meeting were unanimously approved as submitted on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Blake Sebring.

Brian Bates presented the July Financial Report. Monthly offerings for August were \$25,552 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Monthly expenses for August totaled \$37,228, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of August was \$1,154,828. The balance reflected the June ending balance in the funds held with the Lutheran Foundation as the current statement had not yet been received. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$24,481. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through the first eight months of the year, we have expended 63.7 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Natalie Reynolds.

In the Pastor's report, Pastor Ben noted that he is currently spending portions of four days a week at LSUS. He also reported that he will meeting with Doug Reynolds in the coming week to discuss short-term coverage of our music during the Saturday and Sunday services until a more permanent arrangement occurs.

John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. Four members of the Committee – Pastor Ben, Mark Blessing, Blake Sebring and John Stafford – attended our first workshop with the Sacred Places Program. The workshop was a day-long session in Indianapolis. He reported that it was most informative and that it included eleven congregations from across the state. Among the activities that day, each congregation was asked to begin working on a case statement focused on the role they played within their respective community and support for needed facility renovations. The next workshop will be on October 26<sup>th</sup> and will also be in Indianapolis.

Under new business, Blake Sebring noted that as a part of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary preparations, that Committee is planning to conduct video interviews with several long-term members of the congregation. Rachele Dance also provided an update on the activities of the Missions Committee.

On behalf of the Board, Greg thanked Natalie Reynolds for her service on the Board and all the contributions she and Doug have made to Bethlehem.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Rachele Dance seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:35 PM.
