From the Pastor's Desk

The Mission Society Established by God

...the people whom I formed for myself that they might declare my praise. - Isaiah 43:21

As we step into October, we're reminded of how seasons change—but the heart of God never does. Fall comes with its crisp air and vibrant colors, a picture of God's creative hand at work. And just as God is at work in the world around us, He is at work in and through us—calling us to bring His love into the lives of those around us.

In his sermon "The Mission Society Established by God," C.F.W. Walther speaks with a pointed clarity about the purpose of the Church. He says that wherever the Church is, there is mission. This mission isn't reserved for the extraordinary or the

distant; it's not something we pass off to "the professionals" or those with a specific calling to go overseas. It's here. It's now. It's us.

What does that mean for us, here at Bethlehem? It means that God has put us in this place—this very place—for a reason. And His reason is simple but profound: to love the people He has put in our lives, and to tell them the good news of Jesus. That's mission. It's walking across the street to check in on a neighbor. It's opening our home to someone who's lonely. It's speaking a word of hope to the co-worker who's struggling. And it's extending an invitation to church, where people can meet Jesus, who loves them more than they can imagine.

Walther reminds us that God has planted His Church as a beacon of light wherever it is. The people in our community—our friends, our neighbors, those we run into at the store—many of them are carrying burdens they feel they can't unload. They're longing for rest, for peace, for something solid to hold onto in the chaos. And here we are, carrying the message that Jesus is the rest they need, the peace they're searching for, the solid rock in an unstable world. We don't need to be experts. We don't need to have the perfect words. We simply need to live in the grace that God has poured out on us, and let that grace overflow into the lives of others. Every small act of love, every gesture of kindness, every moment where we share the good news of Jesus—it all matters. The Lord uses each seed we plant, and He is the One who makes it grow.

So this October, let's start asking ourselves some simple yet effective questions: who is God calling me to love? Who is He inviting me to share His good news with? And as a church, how can we better reflect the warmth and welcome of Jesus to those in our community? And please do me a favor. Whenever you start getting answers to those questions let me know. Text me. Call me. Email me. Whatever is easiest because I want to know.

Jesus Himself said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few." Let's not wait for someone else to do it. The mission begins with us, right here at Bethlehem Lutheran, in the very places God has put us. He has established His mission, and He promises to work through us as we go. Let's take Him at His word, and watch what He does.






Saturday Morning Women's Bible Study Group

We provided food to 373 individuals. They included 174 children under the age of 18, and 54 individuals over the age of 60. Our congregation provided 417# of food. We went to Community Harvest three times this month to purchase 2100# of food in the amount of \$618. Our 19 volunteers gave 131 hours of their time.

We could use broth, tuna, pasta sauce, peanut butter and diced tomatoes. Thanks to ALL of you for all your many volunteer hours, dedication and the financial support you give to help provide this mission at Bethlehem.

Bethlehem Mission News

Dear Bethlehem Family,

Both from the national news and from talking to our kids in Southeast Asia, we have learned that northern Thailand, Burma (Myanmar), and Laos are experiencing much flooding right now, both from a heavier than usual rainy season and also from a big typhoon named Yagi! This also concerns many members of New Life and Southwest Lutheran Churches, who still have family members in Burma! Please keep all these areas and their loved ones safe as they deal with much loss! It seems many parts of the world, including our own country, are dealing with very strange weather patterns this year. Does this make any of you think we are in the latter days the Bible talks about? Pray that many will come to know to only Way, Truth, and Life while there is still time!

We get the monthly prayer newsletter from Lutheran Bible Translators (LBT), and there are new countries in Africa and Papua New Guinea (PNG) beginning Bible translation for the first time! There are also new translation missionaries seeking support before they go on the field. We will mention a few of these in our prayer requests. We will also continue to lift up countries that are hostile to the Gospel being shared, which we learn about mostly through Open Doors, an organization that Bob's sister and brother-in-law have worked in for many years. Dean and Becky were mostly based in Sidney, Australia, and now they and their children all have dual citizenship as Aussies and Americans! We made it to Thailand 3 times and China once to visit our kids and grandkids, but never to Australia to visit those dear family members! Unfortunately, LCMS World Missions doesn't send many missionaries overseas anymore; mostly seminary professors and

deaconesses such as Caitlin Ramirez.

Your prayers are very much appreciated, both in countries where the Good News is still welcome, and in sensitive areas where Believers are threatened or persecuted!

PLEASE PRAY FOR the Lord to raise up prayer and financial supporters for Nathan and Sarah Federwitz as they continue pre-field training as full-time missionaries!

PLEASE PRAY for wisdom as the Evangelical Lutheran Church Papua New Guinea (PNG) discerns the best strategy to begin Bible Translation there.

PLEASE PRAY FOR at least 10 North Korean Christians (of 250,000 already imprisoned for their faith) who were recently sent to inhumane political prison camps. Pray they would know and feel God's presence. Ask God to surround them with His armies of angels and that they would know His peace that passes all human understanding and guards their hearts and minds (Phil.4:7).

PLEASE PRAY FOR Christians in PAKISTAN who every day live with the knowledge that they or a loved one could be accused of blasphemy against Islam and attacked by angry mobs. Pray that they would be protected and that God would keep them under His wings (Psalm 91:4).

PLEASE PRAY against the strong wave of gang violence sweeping through the country of HAITI and the streets of Port-au-Prince, its capital! Pray for the churches, pastors and missionaries who are working in Haiti and who put their lives at risk on a daily basis.

Pray for wisdom and peace for them.

October is National Depression and Mental Health Month

What is Depression? Simple definition is a mood disorder that causes a persistent feeling of sadness and loss of interest. Depression can affect how you feel, think, and behave and can lead to a variety of emotional and physical problems.

The National Day of Prayer for Mental Illness Recovery and Understanding has been designated as the Tuesday of Mental Illness Awareness Week which is the first full week in October of each year!

So what can be done about this? If you or you know of someone that is feeling this way, what can we do? First of all, don't feel alone? Talk to someone you feel comfortable with, to help relieve the thoughts you are feeling. There is NOTHING WRONG to ask for help! A friend can walk with you, help you talk to people that can help you with the problems. People in the Bible had problems:

- 1) David was troubled and battled deep despair.
- 2) Elijah was discouraged, weary, and afraid.
- 3) Jonah was angry and wanted to run away.
- 4) Job suffered through great loss, devastation, and physical illness.
- 5) Moses was grieved over the sin of his people.
- 6) Jeremiah wrestled with great loneliness, feelings of defeat, and insecurity.

We can be assured, that in whatever we face, Jesus understands our weakness and suffering, our greatest times of despair, because He too traveled that road, yet without sin. He was there in good days and in dark days too. He didn't condemn them for their questions and pain. He didn't tell them to just tough it out. He reached down to their deepest pit of suffering, and lifted them out. He cared. He still works in the same way today. We need people in our lives to help us remember what real grace is and where lasting help is found. The greatest truth is this, we have a Savior who understands our pain, who knows about every weakness and hurt, and reaches out with compassion and hope. He is Healer, Redeemer, Restorer and Friend.

Depression is a common, yet very treatable condition that affects many people. Help is available!! We have God all the time!!!! God helped David, Job, Jonah, and He will help us!!!

As God says in 1Peter 5: 7 "CASTING ALL YOUR ANXIETIES ON HIM, BECAUSE HE CARES FOR YOU." And we do too. You can call church to seek help, talk to pastor, mental health team, and we will help you. Please do not feel alone, God is here and so are we.

O God the strength of the weak and the comfort of sufferers, mercifully accept our prayers, and grant to your children with depression or mental illnesses the help of your power, that our sickness may be turned into health and our concern into joy: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Letting Your Leaves Fall Rachel Wojo October 19, 2023

Little yellow leaves from the front yard tree dance across the porch and driveway. As their bright green color fades, it seems they fall almost as quickly as they change. I love summer affectionately and part of me longs to whisper to the tree "Hold on a little longer. Come on; you got this. Think green!" But graciously the tree listens to its Maker rather than my foolish whispers. In order to flourish in the new season, the tree must let go of its decayed leaves. They have performed well for the term, but their time has drawn to a close.

Autumn is a wonderful time to observe nature. As I watch the swirling leaves stirred by the wind, I am reminded that they display an important lesson for all of us to follow suit in a way. Just as the trees don't stubbornly hold on to their dead leaves, so we shouldn't hold on to any unnecessary weight in our lives. When we long to enter a new season, the old can easily inhibit the new if we allow it. God's Word reminds us to:

Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. Ephesians 4:31,32 (NIV)

To get rid of negativity in our lives, we must first identify it. How can we do this?

- » By reading God's Word.
- » By allowing His Spirit to show us the necessary heart changes we need.
- » By being willing to shun practices such as bitterness and anger.
- » By asking God to help us let go of the guilt from the past.

Oh how the Lord longs to empower and strengthen us for the new season ahead! If we're not sure of the issues detaining a kind and compassionate spirit, He will show us when we ask. And if guilt from the past is preventing this beautiful new season, we have His promises like this one to remember:



THE BETHLEHEM COMMUNITY CENTER COMMITTEE


The Bethlehem Community Center Committee continues to meet and study potential future options for the building. Members recently met with representatives of the Dana Causey Foundation, Angela Moellering of Lutheran Social Services, Trisha LaRowe of Neighborhood Health and visited with Javier Mondragon, CEO of Bridge of Grace.

Committee members have also started a six-month training program with Sacred Places of Indiana which will provide input and guidance for building a plan to move forward. The program will also make the church eligible for grants, including to pay for a necessary and substantial building engineering assessment. We head to Indianapolis for the second meeting on Oct. 26.

The committee members are Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Greg Shediack, Barb Netterville, Blake Sebring, John Stafford, Mark Blessing, Peter Schlie and Kim Brooks. We continue to move judiciously, praying for God's guidance and discernment to know His plans for us. We will regularly provide updates in the Messenger.

Adopted 9-12-2024 Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting August 13, 2024

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Caleb DeMond, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Natalie Reynolds, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: Evans Branigan Guests: Doug Reynolds

The August 13th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:33 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on "I Will Never Cast You Out" by Dane C. Ortland. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's July, 2024 meeting were unanimously approved as submitted on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Brian Bates.

Brian Bates presented the July Financial Report. Monthly offerings for June were \$21,725 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Monthly expenses for July totaled \$36,015, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. Brian noted that the payment for the boiler repairs was not included in the July expenses but likely will be paid in August. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of July was \$1,167,070. This number did not reflect the recent withdrawal of \$25,000 from the Endowment and that the balance reflected the June ending balance in the funds held with the Lutheran Foundation as the July statement had not yet been received. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$23,933. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through the first seven months of the year, we have expended 56 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

The Soul Accounting report from the Board of Elders noted the deaths of members Maxine Smith on July 10th and Barbara Owen on July 11th. Tonya Smith is a new member received by transfer.

In the Pastor's report, Pastor Ben commented that the new listening devices are now fully functioning. The 100th Anniversary Committee has begun meeting. This year the Pastor will again be working with the K-2 grades at Lutheran South Unity School. Lastly, the Grief Share sessions will start up again in August.

John Stafford provided an update on the work of the Community Center Committee. Indiana Landmarks has accepted Bethlehem into their Sacred Places Program. Four members of the Committee will be attending a series of one-day workshops in Indianapolis put on by Indiana Landmarks over the next several months. Our participation in this program will likely make us eligible to receive a grant of up to \$25,000 to examine what improvements may be needed to our building. Members of the Committee also participated in virtual workshop on alternative revenue opportunities sponsored by the Center for Congregations. This organization may be a second opportunity for funding of a physical assessment of our building.

Under new business, the Board discussed the deteriorating condition of the playground equipment which is creating a potentially dangerous situation for users of the facility. Brian Bates subsequently moved, and Caleb DeMond seconded, that we accept the recommendation from the Board of Property Management that the playground equipment be removed and be properly disposed of due to its deteriorated and potentially hazardous condition. The Board of Property Management will implement the removal. The congregation will be informed of this decision during upcoming services.

Lutheran South Unity School has requested that they have an opportunity to present to the Bethlehem congregation their capital campaign, "Power Up", supporting a series of needed improvements to the school building. It was determined that this request was best meet for their presentation to immediately follow the Sunday Service on September 15th. Pastor Ben will communicate back to the school to determine if that date also works for them.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Dan Bates moved and Brian Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:33 PM.


