From the Pastor's Desk

Citizens of Heaven

Our Lutheran Confessions teach something called the "Two Kingdoms." It's a way of describing how God rules the world in two distinct but complementary ways. On the one hand, God rules through His right hand—the kingdom of the Gospel, where Christ reigns in His Church through forgiveness, grace, and His Word. On the other hand, God rules through His left hand—the kingdom of earthly life, where He gives us government, law, and authority to keep order and protect our neighbors. Both are God's good gifts. Both matter. And as Christians, we live in both at the same time.

But here's the key: one of these kingdoms always comes first. It is hard to live in both at the same time but God's reign and rule in the right hand must always influence our mind and actions in the left. Our true citizenship is not in this world, but in heaven. St. Paul writes: "But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Philippians 3:20). That heavenly citizenship shapes everything about how we live in this world. Yes, we are called to be engaged here—working, voting, serving, and caring for our communities. But all of that flows out of who we already are in Christ. Our values, our priorities, even the way we interact with people in everyday conversations—these are formed first and foremost by the Gospel.

And that makes all the difference in a time like ours. We live in a world that is increasingly divided, where people feel pulled to one side or another, where politics often become the most important thing. They become the most relevant thing about us. They become our god. But if our truest identity is in Christ, then we don't need to be swept up in the noise. Instead, we carry heaven's values into earthly life. That means leading with grace, humility, forgiveness, and love, because those are the gifts Jesus has first given to us. Think about how Jesus came to us—He didn't remain distant, but entered into our brokenness in the incarnation. He met people where they were: the tax collectors, the outcasts, the sinners. And He met them with mercy and truth. If that's how our Savior treats us, then that's how we are called to treat others.

And here's an important reminder for us at Bethlehem: while we may differ in how we think about politics or policies, those things must never determine how we treat one another in Christ's Church. The kingdom of the left must never rule our fellowship in the kingdom of the right. Here at the Lord's Table, we are not Democrats or Republicans, not red or blue—we are brothers and sisters in Christ, forgiven and united in Him. That identity comes first. That identity lasts forever.

So instead of focusing only on the national conversation, let's begin with the daily interactions right in front of us—with our family, our coworkers, our neighbors, and especially with one another here at Bethlehem. What if we carried our heavenly citizenship into the way we speak, the way we listen, and the way we extend grace to people who may see the world differently? Yes, we live in a divided world. But we belong to a united Kingdom. And it's from that Kingdom—the Kingdom of Christ—that we receive our true identity, our lasting hope, and our guiding values for how to live and love in this present age. Let's keep this as our focus with Christ as our model.





We provided food to 349 individuals. They included 145 children under the age of 18, and 50 individuals over the age of 60.

Our congregation provided 769# of food. We went to Community Harvest four times this month to purchase 1990# of food in the amount of \$789. Our 15 volunteers gave 118 hours of their time.

We could use soup, peanut butter, boxed/packet baking mixes, pasta sauce and tomato products.



Bethlehem Mission News and Prayers

Dear Bethlehem Family.

Though my husband Bob and I are no longer able to attend most of the services and activities in person at our beloved Bethlehem, we are almost always able to watch the services live or later in the day.

A bit of personal history for us: Bob arranges for our Sunday volunteer organists here at Lutheran Life Villages, since in retirement he worked part time as Chaplain's Assistant at both this location and later also at the Pine Valley location on Coldwater Rd. Bob had received lay training education through Concordia, Wisconsin, and actually both he and Elvis Netterville received a lot of that training from Pastor David Schlie! Anyway, he then remained on as a volunteer until the Covid Pandemic temporarily shut down all volunteer work at all the retirement communities. In all he served LLV for 25 years. We both as nonresident volunteers had to stop leading Bible studies, the Cross Connections groups I helped lead, etc. for a time. But he was soon back at taking turns as Sunday organist and now plays at least twice per month here himself. And most of that time he was still helping out as part-time organist at Bethlehem and as an active member of the Senior Choir.

Most of you know I was Kindergarten teacher at Bethlehem for my last 13 years of teaching in Lutheran Schools, and as long as I could helped teach our Baptism classes, Kids Church classes and helped lead our Saturday morning ladies' Bible studies until I could no longer make it up and down our many stairs in the building. So we both consider ourselves committed members of our dear congregation just as you do; just can't usually be there in person, as is true for many of our more elderly members you may not see in person.

All that is to say we are very excited to be participating, as a very small group of 2, in the book, GENTLE AND LOWLY, by Dane Ortland, that the congregation has chosen to study together this Fall!!! Our daughter had given us that book as a gift before we moved here to LLV almost 2 years ago. We love that all the weekly scriptures are chosen to fit the theme and it is the subject of each weekend's pastoral message by our dear Pastor Ben! The Lord has given Pastor Ben a real vision of the plans He has for our Church on South Anthony Blvd, and we personally are blessed to now live right down the street from our congregation's building and still quite close to LSUS, the mission outreach school we still support with our gifts and prayers!

So, my suggestion for this month is that we each be seeking the Lord on how we can, right where we are be lights shining for Jesus, welcoming those around us to get to know what a wonderful, loving, Prodigal Father, Christ Jesus who is always with us, and the Holy Spirit who lives within each of us Believers, in our lives and locations! For example, Bob and Bill Ihssen help our new Head of Spiritual Care, Pastor James Voorman, lead a class every Tuesday afternoon, and I participate in that class. That group has a real prayer ministry, as does the Cross Connections Bible Study/ support group I lead twice per month. Charlotte Ratliff was recently recognized here as one of our most active volunteers! We have quite a few servers in our dining room who are what we would call "seekers," who are very open to kindness, prayer support and encouragement! No matter how physically active or inactive we can be in our lives, our Lord is eager and willing to use us right where we are! The mess our old world is in is nothing new; tragedies, murders, fear is growing everywhere, and people around us are looking for answers to their fears and sorrows!

Let me leave you with this word of encouragement from Jesus Himself in John 16:33; "I have told you this so that you may have peace in Me. Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world!"




We look forward to a morning of fellowship in God's Word, listening for the Shepherd's voice together, and supporting our neighbors through The Shepherd's Hand.

The Women of Bethlehem purchased 100 quartz crosses, and silk cord for the crosses. Each cross cost less than 50 cents. What happens to these crosses? They will travel to Slidell, LA to the **Forged by Fire Ministry**, where they will be given out with a hot meal to disaster victims.

Forged by Fire Ministries is a disaster relief and community meal non-profit organization, an RSO (Recognized Service Organization) of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod. Their Mission of mercy is simple, feeding and serving people in their time of need. SHARING OUR SAVIOR, ONE MEAL AT A TIME.

Their Vision envision a "Comfort Village" being set-up at disaster sites. This would be a place for someone o grab a bite to ear, wash some clothing, take a shower, relax for a bit and receive some spiritual care before heading back into the muck and mire of recovery work from a disaster. This concept fulfills our mission of feeding and serving the entire person, both body and soul.

Welcome Fall: Finding Rhythm and Joy in the Season of Change

School is starting, the leaves are turning, and pumpkin spice is about to make its annual debut. **For many of us, fall carries a sense of rhythm and routine that summer often lacks** — a chance to return to familiar patterns, nourish our bodies, and reconnect with ourselves and our families.

As the season shifts, I notice myself craving structure: healthier meals, regular exercise, and mornings that aren't a chaotic rush. There's a cultural rhythm baked into fall — family dinners, packed lunches, and cozy routines that signal "we're back." But let's be honest, trying to do it all — morning meditation, walks, breakfast prep, work tasks — can feel overwhelming.

Instead of overloading ourselves with a checklist, this season, I invite you to focus on one or two things you love about fall. Whether it's savoring a warm cup of apple cider, decorating your home with autumn leaves, or enjoying a quiet walk in the crisp air, choose what brings you joy and makes the season feel meaningful.

This mindful approach doesn't just nurture our own sense of self — it creates space for connection with our children. **Research consistently shows that family dinners support positive outcomes for kids**, including lower risk of risky behaviors and stronger emotional bonds. And the magic ingredient isn't just the food — it's the intentional presence we bring.

A simple step toward mindful family connection? Turn off the tech. Make a habit of engaging in PNP (play, no phone) time with your kids. Make the dinner table a no-phone zone, and pretend like it's 1995 for a while. **Phones down, screens off, and conversation on.** Ask open-ended questions, share stories, and engage in real conversation. You can even use a set of "table questions" or Love Maps prompts to spark dialogue. Not only does this help children feel seen and valued, it reminds us that being fully present is possible — even amidst the chaos of work, school, and life.

This fall, let's embrace the goodness of structure and the joy of connection. By focusing on what truly matters — our routines, our loved ones, our own sense of balance — we can step into the season intentionally, savoring the warmth, coziness, and familiarity that makes fall so special.

TIPS FOR FINDING MORE JOY:

- Think about what you can do instead of being stuck on what you can't.
- Dream of the things you would like to do for yourself that would invite joy.

 Maybe you want to start cooking healthy and delicious meals. Or start an exercise regimen.
- Pick one thing to focus on, and then plan to slowly integrate a change into your life.
- Look for something during the day to smile about for a few seconds.
- Smiling evokes a physiological change in your body that allows you to become receptive to positive feelings.
- Don't limit yourself to only feeling joy about your own life. Open a space in your heart to feel joy for others.
- Just being present is a powerfully joyful experience.

When you look for joy — you will find it.

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting September 9, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack, David Schult and John Stafford Members absent: none Guests: Dena Schult

The September regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:36 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided an opening devotion based on Ezekeil 34:11 where God promises to seek out His sheep and John 10:11 where Jesus tells us he is the Good Shepard. God's promise is fulfilled with Jesus' purpose. Pastor closed the devotion with prayer.

The minutes from the Board's August, 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, on a motion from Rachele Dance and a second from Dan Bates.

There were new items for the Soul Accounting.

Treasurer Brian Bates presented the August Financial Report. Monthly income for August was \$38,862 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. This included a \$7,500 contribute from the Summer Clubhouse for the use of our facility. Income from offerings through the first eight months of the year totaled \$234,188 and total income including miscellaneous receipts and extraordinary income totaled \$263,396. Monthly expenses for August totaled \$32,900, compared with monthly budget amount of \$33,668. Expenses for the year through August totaled \$272,209. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of August was \$1,430,462. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through July as we had not yet received the August statement. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$26,460. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through August, we have expended 67 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report as submitted was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

Pastor's report included an update on some modifications to the music during the Saturday and Sunday services in working with Kasey Needham Hapner and Janelle Deal. The discussed arrangements for the upcoming book study (Gentle and Lowly: The Heart of Christ for Sinners and Sufferers) starting with the September 21 service and Bible Study. This year's Thanksgiving Service with be held on Tuesday, November 25th. The book of Isiah will be the topic for the Advent series. Pastor also announced that we will soon be assigned a fieldworker. Matt's Rack will be moving into the building on September 19th and will be located at Bethlehem for at least the next year. They are relocating from the Concordia Lutheran High School due to the renovations soon to begin at that facility. Bethlehem will be the formal grant applicant for the support Matt's Rack has annually received from the Lutheran Foundation.

The Board next continued its discussion of the Lutheran South Unity School governance model. John Stafford indicated his willingness to assist with a group from the school examining this issue. Pastor will submit his name for their consideration.

Blake Sebring updated the Board members on the ongoing activity of the Community Center Committee. As of the Board meeting, we had not received word from Sacred Places regarding our grant application to them for several building repair items. (Subsequent to the Board meeting, we did receive notice that our application had been approved.)

Brian Bates distributed to the board the annual financial review as prepared by Mark Blessing of the Financial Review Committee. He encouraged each Board member to review the report.

We currently have one vacancy among our three delegates to the Concordia Lutheran High School Association. Evans Branigan moved and Brian Bates seconded that John Stafford be appointed to fill that vacancy. The motion passed unanimously.

The Board reviewed 2026 budget request from the $100^{\rm th}$ Anniversary Committee and the information will be utilized as the next year's budget is prepared.

Lastly, Greg Shediack reviewed with the Board a recent discussion held by the Board of Elders regarding building security during the Saturday and Sunday services. It was noted that once the services begin, we will be locking all exterior doors other than the one under the portico on the south side of the church.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:47 PM.

Sacred Places of Indiana has notified Bethlehem it has been awarded a grant of \$66,350 for the Community Center project. Committee members have been working for more than a year to earn this grant, attending four day-long trainings in Indianapolis and building a database of research and history for applications. Bethlehem had to compete against a cohort of 50 applicants.

Sacred Places previously awarded Bethlehem a \$23,500 grant for a total-building assessment to point out trouble spots. This second grant will be used to address those areas, including membrane roof replacement, chimney masonry repairs, outdated ventilation fans, sewer backflow prevention measures and repair to the bell tower.

As part of this award, Bethlehem has two years to complete the repairs and is responsible for matching one-third of the funds provided to give us a total of \$100,000. Per the grant award provisions, we are prohibited from using Bethlehem's endowment fund as any or all of the match.

This award also encourages committee members to apply for larger grants in the future from Sacred Places. We were limited to \$75,000 or less during this application, which had to be filed by June 15 shortly after the training and assessment were completed.

October is Pastor Appreciation Month
