From the Pastor's Desk

Rest for the Weary

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

There is a place in the heart of every believer where the light of faith and the shadow of despair often meet. It's a place where even the most devoted can feel utterly alone, exhausted, and ready to give up. We all have our struggles, whether we are willing to admit them or not. Yet, in that all-too-common place of crisis we are not alone. In this place we find not condemnation from our Lord but His tender, pursuing care.

September is Suicide Prevention and Awareness Month which causes us to consider these things in the story of Elijah in 1 Kings 19:1-8. After a great victory on Mount Carmel, where God put His mighty power on display, Elijah falls into the depths of despair. He is suicidal, struggling through a bonafide mental health crisis. He is fearful, fleeing for his life, and utterly spent. Under a solitary broom tree in the wilderness, Elijah, the mighty prophet, prays that his life might end. "It is enough; now, O Lord, take away my life," he pleads.

We might be tempted to think that such feelings are incompatible with faith. We may have been unintentionally taught that the faithful don't have such moments. But here is Elijah—God's chosen prophet, a man who has just witnessed the fire of heaven descend—and yet he finds himself overwhelmed, at the end of his rope. And what does God do? He does not scold Elijah. He does not chide him for his lack of faith or strength. No, the God of Elijah sends an angel, a messenger of grace. Twice, the angel touches him and says, "Arise and eat, for the journey is too great for you."

God's first act is to nourish and restore. He does not demand that Elijah get up and keep going by sheer willpower. Instead, He meets Elijah in his exhaustion with mercy and ministers to his weary soul. Here is the heart of God for His children in whatever state they may be found. He knows the journey is too great for us. He sees our fragility, our weariness, our weakness and instead of adding burdens, He lifts them. He offers rest.

This story whispers the gospel to us. In Christ, we have a Savior who invites all who are weary and burdened to come to Him and find rest. He knows the frailty of our hearts. He does not demand that we muster up more strength; He comes to us in our weakness. When we are at our lowest, His grace is at its highest.

Elijah's story invites us to bring our own weariness to God, to stop pretending that we are stronger than we are, and to let Him care for us as He did for Elijah. Whether our struggles are with anxiety, depression, or simply the overwhelming weight of life, our Lord comes to us with compassion. He does not turn away from our pain; He steps into it.

In our church, may we be a community that reflects this heart of Christ—where it is safe to admit when the journey is too great, where we care for one another's needs without judgment, and where we point each other to the God who nourishes and sustains us. Death is not the great hope for the depressed and desperate. It is a merciful Heavenly Father and the communion of saints in which each of us has been placed. If you find yourself under your own broom tree today, know this: It's okay. God is not far off. He is near, ready to minister to you in your weakness, with a love that never fails.




Saturday Morning Women's Bible Study Group

We provided food to 374 individuals. They included 165 children under the age of 18, and 60 individuals over the age of 60. Our congregation provided 422# of food. We went to Community Harvest three times this month to purchase 1837# of food in the amount of \$629. Our 15 volunteers gave 116 hours of their time.

We could use broth, tuna, pasta sauce, peanut butter and diced tomatoes. Thanks to ALL of you for all your many volunteer hours, dedication and the financial support you give to help provide this mission at Bethlehem.

Dear Bethlehem Family,

Since our prayer-time format has changed in our worship services, we will no longer have specific mission prayers assigned for each Sunday. However, for those of you committed to praying for specific missionaries and spiritual needs in the Kingdom, we will list prayer suggestions for you to pray for during the month. Please keep this column handy for your daily prayer and intercession times!

Our granddaughter and new grandson-in-law, Sarah and Zack Anderson, for whom we and many in our family were blessed to take part in witnessing their wedding and exchange of vows the end of July, are back from their short honeymoon in Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and are now beginning their first year of marriage in the midst of the cornfields of Illinois, as Sarah put it in her letter this week! Washington, IL is outside Peoria, where Zack grew up and where his life-long home church is. Their mission organization has the policy that a newly married couple in missions should spend their first year on "home assignment," learning how to be married, partner development by sharing with various groups about their changes coming up and looking for additional financial partners. Also, in the Fall, Zack will take an online pre-requisite course for the M.A. in linguistics program that he'll be starting in August 2025 in Chiang Mai, Thailand, where Sarah grew up. Sarah, you may remember, is the daughter of Tim and Michelle Miller, who served in Thailand for many years, but now are working in a more sensitive area. Sarah and Zack also were teaching teammates in a city in that same country. After Zack's masters in linguistics is complete, they hope to return to that country if they will be permitted.

During this year Sarah and Zack will also be supplementing their state-side income by doing substitute teaching; it's more costly to live here than in Southeast Asia! Sarah is checking with Bethlehem about their being able to speak in our Bible Class hour in the Spring of 2025, as Sarah has done before. They are requesting that they might be allowed to do their sharing up in the Sanctuary, as Tim and Michelle did earlier last year, so that hopefully I will be able to attend that. They hope to leave for Thailand in May or June of 2025!

***PLEASE PRAY** for Zack and Sarah Anderson as they prepare to return to Chang Mai, Thailand, with all of the above concerns and items! Thanks!

OPEN DOORS has listed in their September Prayer Calendar countries where believers are in danger for having become Believers:

*PLEASE PRAY for those Christians in Nigeria facing attacks on their lives and villages that desperately needed qualified trauma care workers can work with survivors! Pray for the Lord's comfort and provision, and especially for Pastor Barnabas, for healing after being brutally attacked by Fulani militants. Today, Barnabus pastors thousands of Christians in a camp for internally displaced people. Pray for his ministry and perseverance. Pray also for the children in these camps, that they would grow in their faith and hunger for the Word of God!



***PLEASE PRAY** for Believers in China, especially a 60-year-old couple who left Buddhism to follow Jesus and have led a church for ten years. Authorities recently seized their church building, so the couple continues to host a church in their home. Pray for their protection, and that Believers who are isolated would find a community and grow together.

***PLEASE PRAY** for Algerians who have left Islam to follow Jesus. It is considered an act of mental illness to convert to Christianity in this predominantly Muslim country. Pray especially Meryem, a young college student whose Muslim parents discovered her faith and placed her under house arrest, sedating her. Lord, we cry out for Meryem and pray for her rescue; Amen

Suicide Prevention month

Suicidal thoughts, much like mental health conditions, can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or background. In fact, suicide is often the result of an untreated mental health condition. Suicidal thoughts, although common, should not be considered normal and often indicate more serious issues.

September is Suicide Prevention Month — a time to raise awareness of this stigmatized, and often taboo, topic. We use this month to shift public perception, spread hope and share vital information to people affected by suicide. Our goal is ensuring that individuals, friends and families have access to the resources they need to discuss suicide prevention and to seek help.

While suicide prevention is important to address year-round, Suicide Prevention Month provides a dedicated time to come together with collective passion and strength to address this difficult topic. The truth is, we can all benefit from honest conversations about mental health conditions and suicide, because just one conversation can change a life.

Individual Impact:

79% of all people who die by suicide are male. Although more women than men attempt suicide, men are 4x more likely to die by suicide.

Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death among people aged 10-14, the 3rd leading cause of death among those aged 15-24 and the 12th leading cause of death overall in the U.S.

46% of people who die by suicide had a diagnosed mental health condition — but research suggests that 90% may have experienced symptoms of a mental health condition

Community Impact:

Annual prevalence of serious thoughts of suicide, high risk populations:

U.S. Adults: 4.8% Mixed/Multiracial: 8.2% Young adults aged 18-25: 13% LGBTQ youth: 41% Native Hawaiian/other Pacific Islander: 7.4% American Indian/Alaska Native: 8.5% High school students: 22%

The highest rates of suicide in the U.S. are among American Indian/Alaskan Natives, followed by non-Hispanic whites. Lesbian, gay and bisexual youth are 4x more likely to attempt suicide than straight youth.

Transgender adults are nearly 9x more likely to attempt suicide at some point in their life compared to the general population.

Suicide is the leading cause of death for people held in local jails.

If you know someone who is at immediate risk of suicide, call 911 right away. It can be difficult when someone you know expresses thoughts about suicide, but you can show support by doing the following:

- Talk. Expressing your concern for the person in crisis can be the first step in getting that person help.
- Listen. Being an active listener is another way of reminding a person in crisis that they are not alone.
- Remain Present. Your physical and emotional presence in the person's life makes a difference.
- **Call or text 988.** When someone dials 988, they will be connected to the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. This confidential support line is available 24 hours a day to provide free help to people in suicidal crisis or mental health-related distress.

If you are struggling or in crisis, remember that there is hope and there are steps you can take to seek help and support.


RIGHT TO LIFE






LWML FW SOUTH ZONE FALL GATHERING

God Wants You to Enjoy Life




LSUS NEWS

ADOPTED Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting July 9, 2024

Members present: Brian Bates, Dan Bates, Evans Branigan, Rachele Dance, Natalie Reynolds, Greg Shediack and John Stafford Members absent: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Caleb DeMond Guests: Doug Reynolds

The July 9th regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:34 PM by President Greg Shediack. Greg provided an opening prayer to begin the meeting.

The minutes from the Board's June, 2024 meeting were approved as submitted by the Board on a motion from John Stafford and a second from Brian Bates.

Brian Bates presented the June Financial Report. Monthly offerings for June were \$39,505 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833. Monthly expenses for June totaled \$47,125, compared with monthly budget amounts of \$40,010. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of June was \$1,165,997. The monthend balance in the SSMG Fund was \$36,155. Brian noted than an additional \$12,000 was withdrawn from the SSMG Fund after the end of this reporting period. Brian also presented a report illustrating actual expenses compared with budgeted amounts for the major categories of the Operating Budget. Through the first six-months of the year we have expended 48.5 percent of the budgeted expenses. The monthly Treasurer's Report was unanimously adopted on a motion by Brian Bates and a second by Dan Bates.

The Soul Accounting report from the Board of Elders noted no changes from the congregational membership during the month of June, 2024.

John Stafford noted that the application for participation and potential financial assistance has been submitted to Indiana Landmarks under their Scared Places program and we are awaiting word on acceptance.

Brian Bates provided an update on the repairs to the boiler and the tree trimming.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Evans Branigan moved and Dan Bates seconded a motion for adjournment. After closing with prayer, the meeting was adjourned at 7:25 PM.
