From the Pastor's Desk

Devoted Together

And they devoted themselves to the apostles 'teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. - Acts 2:42

In Acts 2:42 we hear this simple but powerful description of the early church. They devoted themselves to the teachings of the apostles and fellowship with one another. They broke bread and prayed together as a tight knit community of believers. The first Christians weren't running big programs, they were in hiding. They didn't have polished

buildings or complex strategies, they had their homes. What they had was a deep devotion to Jesus and to one another. They gathered around the Word, they prayed, they shared meals, they carried each other's burdens. It was in those ordinary yet beautiful rhythms that the Spirit of God grew His church and gave hope to a weary world.

This fall, we have an opportunity to step into that same pattern of devotion. On September 21st, we'll begin a church-wide Bible study and sermon series where we'll gather in small groups to encourage one another in faith and life. These groups aren't meant to be just another item to add to your calendar—they are intended to be spaces for fellowship, prayer, and growing in Christ together. They are meant to help us give a small glimpse of the early church in your life today. You might consider joining a group, opening your home to host one, or even stepping out in faith to help lead. Each role matters, and each one is a way for us to devote ourselves together to God's Word and His people. If you are homebound, think about how you might gather in other ways. If you are home by yourself, even if you go through this book and study alone, think of ways to extend what you learn into the lives of others. Find some way to grow in community and mutual encouragement in this six week series.

Our study will be based on the book Gentle and Lowly by Dane Ortlund. This book invites us to slow down and take a long, loving look at the heart of Jesus. Again and again, it shows us that Christ is not distant or harsh, but gentle and lowly. He welcomes the weary, the burdened, the sinner, the struggler. His heart beats with mercy for us. It's a book that doesn't just inform the mind but nurtures faith—helping us trust more deeply in the Savior who came not to condemn us, but to lift us up in His compassion. It also helps us see each other through the eyes of Christ.

That's why this study connects directly with our mission at Bethlehem. One part of our mission statement is "nurturing faith." We believe that faith is not something static—it's something that grows as we hear God's Word, as we see Christ's mercy, and as we walk with fellow believers who encourage us along the way. Small groups are one of the best ways to nurture that kind of faith. It helps us grow in relationship with one another and strengthen this body of believers at Bethlehem. They give us space to wrestle with questions, to share life, to pray with and for one another, and to remind each other that Jesus is near.

So I encourage you: don't miss this chance. Be part of a small group. Step up to host or lead if you're able. It won't be difficult! I'll have easy study guides to walk through each week following the sermon. Books are \$10 and will be available on September 7th, if you don't order them on your own. Take this season to devote yourself to the Word, to prayer, and to fellowship. Just as in Acts 2, God will meet us there, in the simple and the ordinary, with His extraordinary grace. I'm looking forward to it!





Bethlehem Mission News and Prayers

I have more news I would like to share from Tim and Michelle's last newsletter, concerning opportunities God has given their Khon and Shi teams already in 2025:

- * First, the Shi team, with help from Khon SE team, recently finished crafting a third set of 24 stories from the Old Testament in their language. They are currently using these audio recordings to create slideshow videos to upload to their YouTube channel and are working to put them into a phone app than can be distributed to villages where the internet signal is weak.
- * Twice a month, the Shi team visits a drug rehab center in the capital to tell and teacher the stories they've crafted to encourage and disciple Shi villagers who are rehabbing from meth addiction. Whole families from their village area have come down to receive this assistance, and are being blessed through these bible stories in their language by our Shi coworkers' special ministry! Sophia told the story of Moses commissioning Joshua in his stead to lead God's people across the Jordon River. One Shi listener was impressed by the pile of stones Moses commissioned the Israelite leaders to put in the middle of the river as a memorial of God's miracle and His ongoing care for His people for future generations!
- * Michelle recently led two afternoon training sessions to develop literacy materials. The Shi interns have started to create resources to teach kids and young people to read stories in their language. They've been having a lot fun doing this!

Besides praying for the above projects in Southeast Asia with the Miller team and for Zack Anderson's classes in linguistics in Chiang Mai, Thailand, Please be praying also for the work happening in closed countries and sensitive areas in other parts of the world that the Word may take root and the Church may flourish!

Our New Life Lutheran friend, Jeanne Burger, asks us to pray for the nursing students in Leogane, Haiti who serving as school nurses, providing much needed health care for the children who attend there. This also helps the students' future as they are better able to listen and learn when they are healthy. Pray that these nursing students will continue to grow in their skills and that God will bless all that they do!

Pray for missionary Heidi Wilkinson who has arrived safely in Ethiopia, as she settles in her new home quickly and begins her work teaching English to students at the seminary there. Pray also for Heidi's adjustment to the culture and work.

Pray also for New Life's Walt Fisher, who goes to the Allen County Juvenile Center to lead worship, share his faith, and encourage the youth who are being held there. Please pray that God's gracious hand will guide and protect Walt as he does this work, and ask the Holy Spirit to be at work in the hearts of the youth as they hear the Word of God through music, message, and prayer.





Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting Aug. 12, 2025

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Evans Branigan, Dan Bates, Rachele Dance, Blake Sebring, Greg Shediack, David Schult and Brian Bates Members absent: John Stafford Guests: Dena Schult

The August regular monthly meeting of the Board was opened at 6:28 PM by President Greg Shediack. Pastor Ben provided a devotion that talked about the sermon he is writing for his father's final service at Holy Cross. It was based on a reading from Psalm 118, choosing to honor the Lord and cut off things from the world, including, "This is a day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it."

The minutes from the Board's July 2025 regular monthly meeting were unanimously approved as submitted, after being reviewed previously online.

The Soul Accounting report as forwarded from the Board of Elders included the passing of Joan Domrow on July 14 and Nancy Kruger on July 15.

Brian Bates presented the monthly Financial Report. Monthly income for June was \$23,608 compared with a budgeted amount of \$26,833.33. Year to date income from offerings is \$203,320.68 and total income including miscellaneous receipts and extraordinary income totaled \$224,534.51 which is 55.6% of budget. Monthly expenses for July totaled \$42,117.04, compared with a monthly budget amount of \$33,668. This included an organ tuneup and a window repair and camera placement. Expenses for the year through July totaled \$239,309 or 59.2% of budget. The balance in the Endowment Fund at the end of July was \$1,386,938. That portion of the Endowment Fund resting with the Lutheran Foundation was current through May as we had not yet received the July statement. That endowment is \$1,337,235. The month-end balance in the SSMG Fund was \$26,344.

The yearly totals are expenditures of \$239,309 of \$404,019 or 58.2% of the annual budget.

The treasurer's report was accepted unanimously.

In the Pastor's Report, Pastor Ben talked about his recent trip for a week to St. Louis to visit Bethlehem Lutheran Church. They have a lot of experience reaching out to their neighborhood, and fundraising. They have 37 students in their micro-school. They have 8-10 streams of revenue coming in on top of \$60,000 in offerings, including things such as rentals and childcare. Pastor Bolling will speak soon with our Community Center Committee.

A representative from Camp Restore (a Missouri Synod non-profit) whom he met on his previous trip to Detroit's Bethany Lutheran talked to our Community Center Committee in July about how to engage the neighborhood.

There are future plans to update our Bethlehem website and looking at possibly using other forms of hymns.

GriefShare starts a 12-week cycle starts Aug. 19. Theresa Lightning is taking over the leadership role for the late Richard Pierce.

We are starting a small group Bible study based on the book Gentle and Lowly running six weeks Sept 21 through Oct. 26. It talks about Jesus' love for sinners, who he is taking care of and why. Sermons will lead into the small group sessions.

An email was sent out to Bethlehem's members about the need for school board representatives from Bethlehem at LSUS. We currently have one sitting, Theresa Lightning, and we need two more. None of the students at LSUS are members of the four core churches. Greg asks what this means for Bethlehem going forward, and we need to have a larger discussion about this as a board and congregation. He asks us to pray for guidance. Ninety-nine percent of the school's money comes from the state through the voucher program.

The Community Center is still waiting to hear from Sacred Places on our grant status. We're waiting to hear on that so we can make our next steps forward. We continue to reach out to potential non-profit partners.

New business: Advent Tea will be held Dec. 7.

The next voters meeting will be on Dec. 14 which will include elections.

Pastor said we are in line to receive another field worker soon.

After a motion by Evans Branigan and a second from Rachele Dance, Pastor Ben led us in prayer to close the meeting at 7:31 p.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for Sept, 9 at 6:30 p.m.

As we look forward to celebrating 100 years of God's mercy and love at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in the year 2026, we have set the goal of raising \$100,000 as a sacrificial "thank you" to God for all He has done in and through Bethlehem over the years. The project will cost around \$27,000 and is the first benchmark set for fundraising. The committee has come up with a list of options and design choices for this project that will be presented and decided upon at our December 14th voter's meeting. Please make it a point to attend and give your input!

Our second project that we will tackle after that is new signage and awnings for outside and inside our building. If you have been a member at Bethlehem for a long time you know exactly where to go for each activity. We need to provide clarity for those visiting us for the first time. We also need to update the names of rooms to what they currently are rather than what they used to be. This effort will make both member and visitors confident in their navigation of our beautiful building.

The final project will be a pavilion for our green space across Euclid Avenue. We've moved outward from our worship space, to our halls and now outside where we interact with our neighborhood. We will put forth plans for dimensions and specifications for this structure so that we have an outdoor space to meet and grow with our neighborhood. This space will be used for outdoor worship, barbecues and block parties. It will be funded after we've raised the money for the previous two projects. The stretch goal beyond these three projects would be beautifying the space more around the pavilion so that it is an enjoyable, beautiful and peaceful place for us to enjoy with our neighbors.

Specifics for all of these projects will be coming soon. So keep an eye out for future communications. You can start giving to these projects right away. Please just write the words "thank offering" on the memo line of your check and it will get to the right place. Official envelopes specific to these projects will arrive in the new year. Although we don't have every detail yet, we wanted to communicate what we do know so you can begin thinking about how you might contribute to these things. As a response to God's faithfulness "throughout all generations" at Bethlehem, we will make these dreams a reality! Thanks for your love and care for our church and we look forward to what God will do throughout this centennial year of celebration!
