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FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



The Story Isn't Over

"Lord, You have been our dwelling place in all generations." - Psalm 90:1

One of the things that has struck me most during this year of celebrating Bethlehem's 100th anniversary is realizing just how many stories this place holds. This month, on September 12 and 13, we will welcome back alumni and former members for a special reunion and reception. I am really looking forward to hearing the stories that come out of that weekend. Stories about teachers and classmates. About Christmas programs, confirmation classes, friendships, and Sunday mornings. Stories about growing up here and, for many, stories about how Bethlehem helped shape the people they would eventually become. Because one thing has become very clear to me this year: people really loved this place. I have been amazed by how often I meet someone who has not been connected to Bethlehem for years and yet still lights up when they begin talking about it. People have moved away. They have built lives and families all over the country. But Bethlehem remains a part of their story. And that is something worth celebrating.

Of course, the deeper truth is that these are not ultimately just stories about Bethlehem. They are stories about what God has done in and through this place. Our theme verse for this anniversary year says, "Lord, You have been our dwelling place in all generations." That verse reminds us that, through every generation, God has been faithful. Long before any of us arrived at Bethlehem, God was already at work here. He gathered His people. He baptized children. He forgave sinners. He taught His Word. He fed His people at His Table. He comforted the grieving and strengthened the weary. And He did all of that through generations of people who faithfully served, taught, gave, prayed, sang, built, welcomed, and loved.

In many ways, I have started to think of Bethlehem's history as an anthology, a collection of stories

gathered together into one larger story. There are stories of people who helped begin this congregation in 1926. Stories of students and teachers who filled the school. Stories of families who were baptized, confirmed, married, and buried here.

Stories of friendships formed in these halls and faith strengthened in this sanctuary. Some of those stories we know well. Others have nearly been forgotten. But together they tell the story of a God who has been faithful to Bethlehem through every generation. And here is the exciting thing: The story isn't over.

We have spent a great deal of time this year looking back, and rightly so. We should remember. We should celebrate. We should give thanks for those who came before us. But we do not look back simply so that we can wish things were the way they used to be. We look back so that we can remember who God is.

The God who was faithful to Bethlehem in 1926 is the same God who is with us in 2026. And if the Lord has truly been our dwelling place in all generations, then we can trust Him with the generations that are still to come.

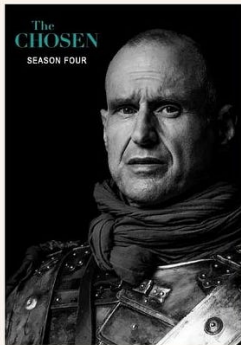
There are still stories waiting to be written. There are people in our neighborhood who have not yet heard the good news of Jesus. There are children who need to know that they are loved. There are families looking for a place to belong. There are neighbors who need hope, friendship, and someone willing to walk alongside them. Perhaps someday, years from now, people will gather for another Bethlehem reunion. And maybe they will tell stories about what God did here in the 2020s. What stories will they tell? What will they remember? What chapters will we add to the anthology that has already been written?

We do not know exactly what the future holds. But we know the One who has carried Bethlehem through the past one hundred years. And by His grace, we get to be part of the next chapter. So this month, as we welcome alumni and friends back home, let us listen to their stories. Let us celebrate the legacy that has been given to us. Let us give thanks for the generations who loved this place and faithfully passed it along. And then let us look forward. Because the story of Bethlehem is still being written. And I, for one, cannot wait to see what God does next.

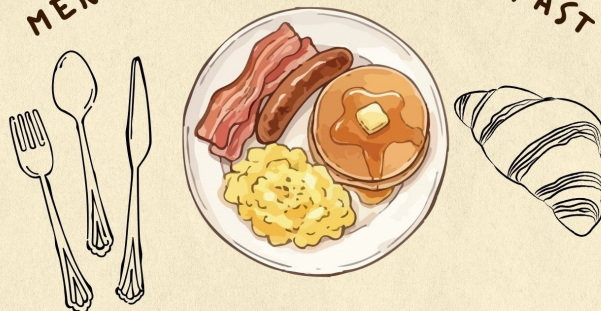

JULY 2026 FOOD BANK REPORT

We provided food to 316 individuals. They included 133 children under the age of 18 and 44 individuals over the age of 60. Our congregation provided 834# of food. We went to Community Harvest 3 times this month to purchase 1087# of food in the amount of \$461. Our 15 volunteers gave 129 hours of their time. Thanks to ALL of you for all your many volunteer hours, dedication, and the financial support you give to help provide this mission at Bethlehem. We are in need of canned vegetables and strawberry jelly.

Bethlehem Lutheran Church Celebrating 100 years 1926-2026

“Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations.” Psalms 90:1

September 14, 1926, Bethlehem was chosen as the name of the church. The cornerstone contained the Holy Bible, Luther’s Small Catechism, Lutheran Hymnal, a copy of Church Constitutions, a copy of the Lutheran Witness, a copy of the Lutheraner, a copy of Central District Messenger, copies of Ft Wayne News-Sentinel and Journal Gazette, and the names of those serving in the church and schools, as well as the names of the students.

9 September 2012. This marked the 85th Celebration with Rev. San May, Indiana District President, as the guest preacher.

On Sept. 12, a Bethlehem Church and School Alumni dance and reunion will be held at the Allen County Fairgrounds, and former Bethlehem student and Pastor Steve Ensley returns to lead the following Sunday 9 a.m. service with a reception to follow.

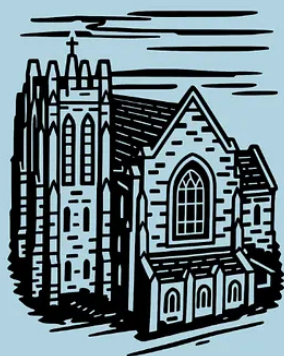

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES

Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church

Board of Directors Regular Monthly Meeting

Aug. 11, 2026

Members present: Pastor Ben Ahlersmeyer, Greg Shediack, John Bates, John Stafford, Blake Sebring, Brian Bates, Dan Bates

Absent: Dave Schultz, Rachele Dance.

August regular meeting started at 6:31p.m.

Pastor Ahlersmeyer started with a devotion based on something he read about King Arthur, a story about the knight Lancelot. He had an affair with a woman who looked like Arthur's wife, who then bore a son. He struggled with forgiveness, which reminded Pastor of a text from 1John 1:8-9. If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us from all unrighteousness. If we confess our sins, forgiveness is there and that is one of our main focuses as the church.

In the Community Center report, the group reassessed our status and goals during a July meeting. We have not been able to find a candidate to sponsor the majority of the space, so we are looking for smaller uses of the space. We are meeting soon with Lloyd Jones, director of Life Adult Day Academy. We are also close to matching the original grant from Sacred Places. Pastor also met with Lutheran Church Expansion Fund.

The minutes from the June meeting were approved. There was no meeting during July.

In the Treasurer's report, following up on June, the offerings were nearly \$11,000 over budget, and the expenses were \$5,780 under budget. In July, offerings were \$7,000 under budget, but we are still 4 percent over budget for the year. Expenses through July are at 58 percent, which is on track for the year. The endowment fund is at \$86,565 from Wells Fargo, and \$1.4 million for the Lutheran Foundation.

The report was accepted unanimously.

In the Pastor's report, the LSUS started its year on Aug. 12, after eight Bethlehem people helped with a cleanup day on Aug. 8 as part of the 100th anniversary celebration...Plans are being made for fall and winter services. LWML Sunday is Oct. 4, the Missions Sunday is Oct. 11, and confirmation will be held on Nov. 1, which is All Saints' Day. The Thanksgiving service will be held the Tuesday before Thanksgiving. There are still ongoing discussions about whether we continue to have a Christmas Day service, possibly allowing us to emphasize the Christmas Eve service. More Work is being done to update the church website.

In New Business, the board would officially like to give thanks for everyone who pitched in on July's very successful Community Festival as part of our 100th Anniversary Celebration. We survived and thrived on a very warm, uncomfortable

day. The response has been tremendous from the community during and after.

The meeting adjourned after prayer at 7:40 p.m.

The next board meeting is Sept. 8 at 6:30p.m.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TAKING SOME TIME ON LABOR DAY TO THINK ABOUT WHAT IT MAY MEAN TO THOSE WHO AREN'T WORKING OR CAN'T WORK BECAUSE OF ADDICTION AND OR MENTAL ILLNESS.

Labor Day in the United States of America is a public holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. It honors the American labor movement and the contributions that workers have made to the strength, prosperity, laws, and well-being of the country.

Most of us who work have the day off and we tend to see the holiday generally as the last summer weekend before the cold weather comes in.

For those struggling with addiction or mental health issues, however, is often another reminder of how they feel alienated from society. On a day where all things “work” is celebrated, for people who don’t work or who don’t feel connected to society through their work, this is a day where they feel their experiences are once again anything but normal. There is a connection between (lack of) work and mental health/addiction, and the connection is generally a negative one.

There are many studies that show the longer someone is unemployed, the more likely they are to turn to alcohol and drugs and the more depressed and anxious they become. The unemployment rate for those struggling with addiction and or mental illness is significantly higher than the general population.

All of the celebrations during Labor Day are well deserved. Many in this country work incredibly hard and deserve a day off, time with friends and family and time to end properly end their summers and get ready for the end of the year. However, the day is

also time to reflect on the millions of people who aren't working because of an addiction or mental illness and therefore have little to celebrate on this holiday. Living in a society that places so much value on optimizing productivity in the workplace defines people not by who they are but rather by what they do for society leaves those without a "job" without any sort of identification, which most definitely will lead to negative self-worth and all that accompanies that.

We must be supportive of those struggling with addiction and mental health to find meaningful work as part of their recovery.

Joy in Your Labors

"Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men." Colossians 3:23

As women, our days can be filled with many kinds of labor. Some of it is visible and appreciated. Much of it is not. We prepare meals, care for families, serve our churches, encourage friends, work at our jobs, clean, organize, volunteer, teach, listen, pray, and often carry responsibilities that no one else even notices. Sometimes our work feels meaningful and joyful. Other times it feels like one more thing on an already-too-long list. God's Word reminds us that our value does not come from how much we accomplish. Even our ordinary, everyday work can become an opportunity to serve Him. A meal prepared with love, a phone call to someone who is lonely, a child taught God's Word, a church task completed faithfully can all be acts of service.

We often think joy will come when our work is finished. But Scripture points us to a different kind of joy. Our joy isn't ultimately found in what we accomplish. It is found in Whom we serve. That means we don't have to prove our worth through our work. We don't have to earn God's love. We don't have to be perfect.

There will be days when our labor is difficult.

We may feel tired, unappreciated, overwhelmed, or discouraged. We may wonder whether what we do really matters. Those are the moments when we can remember Galatians 6:9:

“And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up.”

God sees the work that others overlook. He sees the prayers whispered in the quiet. He sees the tears shed when no one is watching. He sees the sacrifices made out of love.

He sees the faithful service that may never receive applause. And He promises that our labor in Him is never wasted.

Perhaps today we can look at our responsibilities differently. Instead of becoming frustrated by the ordinary, we can recognize the ordinary as an opportunity. Our strength will sometimes fail. But His strength never does. Our days may feel ordinary. But God can use ordinary women doing ordinary things to accomplish extraordinary purposes in His kingdom.

So whatever God has placed before you today, do it with a willing heart. There can be joy even in the ordinary. There can be purpose even in the unnoticed. There can be peace even when the work is unfinished. For we do not labor alone. We labor with the Lord, for the Lord, and because of the love He first gave us.
